#### 'Walkability, Advanced Traffic Management' among Chamber Infrastructure topics

From relieving traffic to the possibilities of 'choice" lanes, Town of Farragut, state and Knox County officials shared what they are doing to help deal with the population growth in regards to area roads during a Farragut West Knox Chamber of Commerce Breakfast Speaker Series on Infrastructure Impact held in Fox Den Country Club Thursday, May 4.

"I want to find out if they are going to put some (short cuts) for us to get to work," said Bin There Dump That consultant Connor Buis, who was among 130 who attended the breakfast series. "I'm on the road all day."

A panel consisting of Farragut Mayor Ron Williams; Steve Borden, Tennessee Department of Transportation Region 1 director/assistant chief engineer; Knox County Mayor Glenn Jacobs; and Jim Snowden, Knox County chief engineer, fielded questions about traffic and other road concerns.

"What are the biggest trouble spots you hear about traffic in Farragut and surrounding areas?" moderator Whitney Kent, WVLT-TV account executive/host, asked Williams.

He answered the Interstate's proximity affects the Town's traffic.

"All of us locals, we just get over to the left lane (of Interstate 40/75) and, in a few minutes, we get through it. We get off at Campbell Station and Watt Road," Williams said.

### **HVA** Galloway pair support Speas, but Henderson wait-see

**KNOXVILLE** — A husband and wife tandem, both with deep ties to Hardin Valley Academy and the Hardin Valley community, spoke on behalf of bringing back Dr. Rob Speas as HVA principal during Knox County Board of Education's Public Forum time to conclude its Thursday, May 4, meeting.

The only remaining varsity sports head coach/teacher from the school's opening day in August 2008, Jennifer Galloway

was joined by her husband, Keith Galloway, a former HVA varsity basketball head coach/ teacher, in voicing their support to lift Speas' indefinite administrative leave, which came a few days after criticism was voiced about the handling of an intentionally set gas leak (by a since-fired custodian) at the school March 30.

However, 6th District KCBE representative Betsy Henderson stated in an e-mail to farrragutpress, "While this incident is still being investigated, I support (superintendent) Dr. (Jon) Rysewyk's decision to put Dr. Speas on leave until the investigation is complete. Because we do not yet know all the facts, it is important that the

administration continue the investigation uninterrupted. ... Dr. Rysewyk sent a message to parents with an update May

1," she added. "It said, 'As we have worked through the formal review, our process has crossed over into items that are also being investigated by the Knox County Sheriff's Office. Because of the ongoing criminal investigation, we are unable to provide a detailed update at this time."

## Support voiced for FBA survival; Krempasky praised

Four Farragut business representatives voiced their support of Shop Farragut/Farragut Business Alliance and its executive director Steve Krempasky during Farragut Board of Mayor and Aldermen's citizens comments portion of its meeting Thursday, April 27.

During a BOMA workshop, which occurred before the regular meeting, FBA chair Candace Viox, Water Into Wine bistro & lounge owner, described what FBA does for the community and its role.

While no action was taken, Vice Mayor Louise Povlin said she wanted to see the funding defined between community events and Shop Farragut events.

"I appreciate everyone coming out, seeing everybody

here and the impact we're making. We want to ... give

people a quality service and do things a little different,"

- Keith Lane, who co-owns a new area business that has transformed itself from home-based into brick-and-

mortar. (Read story beginning on page 5A)

"We couldn't do what we do for our small businesses without Steve, and that's why I reached out to several of our small business partners in the area," Viox said. "The events are vital to our marketing.

'A lot of our mom and pops, the jewelry makers, the people who make candles in their basements, the bakers that make cookies, they don't have large budgets," she added. "They can't afford to go to Rossini Festival and spend \$1,000 for a weekend at an event.'

However, Viox said they can come to a Shop Farragut event and "be able to reach people from our

"I just want to make sure Farragut Business Alliance continues to get funding because our businesses need it," she added.

"I'm here to advocate for Steve Krempasky and the Faragut Business Alliance," said Cheri Inveld, co-owner of Euphoric Cheese Shop and soon-to-open Sparrow Wine Bar. "Steve was one of the first people affiliated with the Town to come welcome us to the community when we were under construction, approximately two-and-a-half years ago.

## 'Engaged' turnout for Farragut's public strategic plan meetings

While the Town of Farragut hosted two public meetings on its strategic plan in Farragut Community Center Tuesday night, April 25, and Wednesday morning, April 26, the turnout was light but engaged.

However, "We've had about 570 folks visit the website (Farragut Forward) that's been developed just for this project," said Julia Novak, executive vice president with Raftelis, who leads the management consulting practice of the firm heading up the project.

She added of those who visited the website,

many did not comment.

Commenting on the Town's "vision" statement, "Farragut — redefining quality of life with a beautiful, close-knit, connected community where families and businesses thrive," attendee Don Mann replied, "I see the word 'connected community.' I think a lot of us are very frustrated about the traffic that's happened.

"All that infrastructure comes after growth, but it's getting pretty heavy right now," he added. "When I see connected community, we're connected by cars, and it's very difficult to get around the cars lately.

Sue Stuhl, former Town Parks and Recreation director, said connection to her means sidewalks but agrees about the traffic issues.

"I agree with the traffic issues, but I also feel that traffic is very close-knit and connected on a personal level," Megan Hedge said. "Our neighborhoods are connected ... and the schools feel connected."

Still, she also agreed about the traffic issues, as well as school overcrowding issues.

While five attended Wednesday's meeting, Novak said eight attended Tuesday's gathering. On Wednesday, attendees most voiced concerns about traffic in regards to developments in Town, as well as safety.

Farragut Board of Mayor and Aldermen currently are in the process of updating its annual Strategic Plan, for which it hired Raftelis, a consulting firm, to complete.

Following residents input as to what adjustments they should see and suggestions for projects, Novak said her group will "pull all that together, along with the information from the website, and present it to the Town as part of the strategic planning workshop we have with the Board," taking place Tuesday, May 9, after deadline. (See in a future farragutpress issue)

The Board developed a strategic plan in 2017 and are using that plan as the framework for the basis for starting this year's plan, she added.

"I'm very interested in what's going on in Town," Mann said. "I've been a resident 20 years. I'm very close to property being considered for future land development."

"I'm just here because we are in a small group that organized for something specific and we're still working on that, but it also opened our eyes to planning and the whole process," Lori Lyell

Novak said there are four elements of the plan: a vision statement, mission, values and strategic outlines or goals.

She also asked, "What do we know to be true today? What we hope will be true in the future - our vision? And, how do we get there?' "Strategic plan is in that three- to five-year

strategic planning for local governments for 20 years, and I will say that the time frame for a plan is getting shorter and shorter because the rapidity of change is so much faster." Regarding quality of life, "there's some anxi-

time frame," Novak added. "I've been doing

ety in this Town right now," Mann said. "There's a Biddle Farm development that's created a lot of controversy.'

"Redefining if you want something smaller, different (than Knoxville) ..." Lyell said.

"...Safer," Hedge added.

the first place," she added.

Additionally, "the events of the Farragut Business Alliance are a great way for Farragut citizens to gather, connect and make memories," Inveld said. "I'm afraid if Steve's position goes away, so will some of these opportunities that strengthen our community."

Krempasky "is the one who asked me to come and be part of the board of Farragut Business Alliance," said Debby Funk, owner of Embroidery Boutique by Designs for You and Funky's Meat Snacks. "He always supports my businesses and what I do, but I wanted to state I'm on the side of the business that a lot of my business is not in Farragut.

"My actual business is in Farragut, but I bring a lot of outside businesses to Farragut," she added. "So, when we have these events and things, I personally feel that we should not be alienating outside businesses because, for me, it helps my business to be able to have these outside companies come to these events and support us.

"When we start putting medical decisions into educational policy, I think we're in a place we shouldn't be," said Jennifer Owen, 2nd District rep, in support of in-school ABA, during a non-voting workshop meeting Monday, May 1.

ABA therapy in KCS "should have happened a long time ago," she added.

Owen said ABA is a "prescription from their doctor, just like if they were taking a medication," adding the Board "is not qualified to question a medical diagnosis. ... We should be deferring to the physician of that student."

While saying disruptive behavior, such as a child of need

"I hope what you heard me say, what I'm trying to do is delineate out Shop Farragut and our community events," Vice Mayor Louise Povlin said. "Our community events are of value, but ...they're not necessarily tied to just Farragut.

"In my mind it's a funding issue," she added. "It shouldn't matter to you what bucket it comes from, (but) to me it matters because I'm approving a budget and it has to make sense."

With the Shop Farragut funds, "we have to show some value of that, separate from the community events, which also have value but in a different way," Povlin said.

Michelle Austin, JCPenney general manager, also publically supported FBA, but as a large business representative.

"This is my fifth JCPenney's that I've been in," she said. "Steve greeted me, probably in the first six months of my coming to that store, and I knew at that moment that he felt all the businesses were part of the community, whether we're large or small, and I appreciated that."

As part of a corporate business, Austin said she tries to

who "runs out the door every day ... is disruptive to absolutely everything in the whole school," Owen said the child's ABA therapist can help prevent this.

Katherine Bike, 4th District rep, reiterated that the much-needed ABA therapy causes these students of need "to miss a lot of school" without being allowed during school hours.

Moreover, Bike said she is "a member of the autism community ... I have some experience with my son."

"As a parent with a son with Sensory Processing Disorder I understand he needs some things other children in his educational setting don't need," said Daniel Watson, 3rd District rep.

The task is "how to we create

get back to the grass roots and be part of community events.

"I appreciate FBA because I feel like it really helps all the businesses feel (like they are part of the community) whether they are big or small," she said

Being involved in the community, "We have been big supporters of Steve and Shop Farragut when it comes to these events because it's a way for us to meet potential customers," The Knox Fox Real Estate Group co-owner Eric Whitener said of himself and wife, Teri Jo Fox. "It's a way for us to grow our business and grow our brand in a way we wouldn't be able to do otherwise.

"I'd never be able to have an event in my parking lot because it doesn't have the ability; I don't have the budget," he added. "So, being able to piggy back on these (FBA) things is an important thing for us.

"Another thing for us to consider, too, is what it means to the community — the ability to bring people together and bring businesses. ... I do think these are good opportunities for businesses who want to come to Farragut to get the exposure they need."

a policy that allows for the appropriate access to individual medical and therapeutic interventions for individual children?" Watson said.

Such in-school therapies "are going to have a lifelong impact on these children," he added.

"I am not opposed to ABA therapy at all," said Kristi Kristy, 9th District rep and Board chair, but added this issue "needs to go to policy review" before taking action. "... I would like to see a policy that is more comprehensive."

Susan Horn, 5th District (Farragut) rep, said the Board needs to look "more broadly because there will be other things. ... So that we have an answer for this and other like issues that will come up."

"But the travelers don't know that," he added. "They see (congestion) and they hop on their Google (GPS) or whatever else and it says to get off and go to Kingston Pike and take a right, go to Campbell Station, take a right and get back on the freeway.


"So, really with the new exits that are going to be done at Campbell Station and Watt Road and, I assume, widening of the freeway, I think that will help the traffic jams that we have."

He added the Town also is in Phase 1 of obtaining the Advanced Traffic Management System, a traffic light upgrade allowing the Town to manage the lights to help alleviate traffic when needed.

Countywide, "even relatively short distances, 2 to 3 miles, can be insurmountable when sidewalks don't exist along major thoroughfares. In addition to working on improved mass transit, are there plans to look at longer distance walkability?" Kent asked county panelists.

"One thing that is very important to us is parental responsibility zones," Jacobs answered.

"According to law, if you live a mile-and-ahalf (from) an elementary school, we're not required to provide bus transportation. "In a lot



cases, of

those kids are going to walk to school, and for parents, without a sidewalk, we literally made it impossible for them to comply with the law safely," he added. "That's something we're looking at."

Knox County is collaborating with City of Knoxville and Town of Farragut to update the county's Comprehensive Land Use Transportation Plan through Advance Knox, which is being considered.

"One of the things we want to do to further that walkabilty goal is to have places more conducive to walking, (such as) Town centers and corridor redevelops, where developments connect with each other," Snowden said.

Regarding state highways and Interstates, Kent asked about "easy path lanes."

"Governor (Bill) Lee signed the Transportation Moderation Act recently, and the legislation included a choice lane for Tennessee drivers who can pay to avoid congestion during peak hours," she added in her question. "Where will those first be implemented and soon can we see them?"

Borden estimated those lanes are about seven years out, "but we're at the beginning of the process."

Once the investigation is complete, "I have requested that KCS host a public meeting at HVA so everyone can hear the facts and ask questions," Henderson said. (More on Henderson's thoughts later in this story)

#### Jennifer Galloway

"... 865 Ready is a new initiative in Knox County Schools. but many don't know that Dr. Speas already started that movement in his first four years at Hardin Valley," said Jennifer Galloway, varsity girls basketball head coach since 2008. "We are headed in the right direction to prepare our kids to be 865 Ready and for them to make an impact in the Knoxville community and beyond.

"This is largely because of Rob Speas," she added. "And despite (having) some of the most challenging years with COVID and its aftermath, we are moving forward — and we are moving forward fast.

"We have changed our building lay-out and our schedule so that our kids have the space and time to experience all that the 865 Academies program has to offer. Rob is a leader in this movement; he is the driving force behind the innovative things we are doing at HVA."

However, "Momentum has been halted over the last month. We are in a holding pattern as we wait for answers while our leader is being investigated, and we watch while his name is getting dragged through the mud," said Jennifer Galloway, also freshman academy dean. "HVA and Dr. Speas have been misrepresented in the news and on social media.

"So now we wait for answers, hoping that we get our leader back — and not just another setback," she added. "What do I mean by 'setback?" Some teachers at HVA are under the impression that even if Dr. Speas is exonerated by the investigation, he still may not be back at HVA next year.

"I can't imagine why this would even be considered with as much support as he has from our staff and community.  $\dots$  No one seems to be willing to say that if Dr. Speas did nothing wrong, then of course he would be re-instated at HVA."

If Speas is not re-instated, "Our 865 Ready efforts will be set so far behind it might take us years to recover," Jennifer Galloway said.

Regardless, "We'll find a way to be better in all we do academically, athletically and artistically — and Rob Speas, he will land on his feet wherever that may be," she said. "But Rob is a Hawk, his own kids are Hawks ....

"So, when this investigation shows he did the right thing. please make sure the place he lands is back at Hardin Valley Academy."

#### **Keith Galloway**

"... We are incredibly disheartened by how this whole situation is playing out with the gas leak incident ...," Keith Galloway said. "... An absolutely false narrative spread on social media, causing people to believe something happened that did not happen. ... They are the loud minority and they do not represent what our community thinks of (Speas)."

Saying he's gotten to know Speas "in multiple capacities these last few years," Keith added, "There is no one I would rather have more as a principal at HVA than Rob.

"... He took the challenge seriously of continuing what Sallee Reynolds had successfully started (first HVA principal from 2008 to 2019), but in his own unique way. ...

Keith Galloway said "it would be an absolute travesty if he does not end up back at HVA. Our community wants him there and the vast majority of students and parents want him there. ... and the teacher and staff want him there. ...'

#### **More from Henderson**

"This incident has been incredibly hard on our community and especially the parents, students and staff at HVA," Henderson stated.

"... Dr. Rysewyk makes decisions based on facts in any given situation and not based on public opinion or even the opinion from a board member," she added.

... Parents, teachers, and students deserve to know the facts. I have encouraged the KCS staff to complete the investigation as quickly as possible without sacrificing thoroughness so our community can begin to heal."

KNOXVILLE - Johnny Brusco's New-York Style Pizza's new owners and long-time friends, Beau McKee and Chris Gambill, have more than just pizza on the menu at the restaurant, 1620 Choto Markets Way in Markets at Choto.

Along with the signature pizzas, the restaurant serves subs and wraps, wings, salads, Italian dinners, stromboli, calzones and appetizers, from bread stix to fried pickles.

McKee and Gambill took over the Choto franchise Saturday, April 1.

"I'm excited," McKee said. "With the growth Knoxville is experiencing, I think we can expand the brand in Knoxville and surrounding areas. That's the plan –

- fingers crossed. "We've already brought back the smash burgers," he added. "We've added a couple appetizers."

One feature unique to the franchise is customers can order pizza by the slice.

While the Johnny Brusco's brand items are proprietary and must stay the same, "they do allow us some flexibility to run features," McKee said. "Down the road, we'll probably add some sandwiches and stuff to the menu.

McKee pointed out the current appetizer menu includes a lot of fried items and bread.

"Hopefully, within a week, we'll have wine and liquor in here as well," he added. "We're going to do some signature cocktails, probably leverage

the Italian theme.

"We're going to have specials throughout the week and happy hour. Hopefully, down the road, we'll implement some brunch hours."


Outside, "we're going to have a bunch of games on the patio - darts, got some new corn hole boards — and make that a happening spot," McKee

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



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

#### Dog bed wetting may be more than incontinence

Q: I have been finding my dog's bed is wet in the morning for a couple of weeks. I used to notice this a few times a month, but now it is every day. Sandy seems to feel great, but she acts like she may not even know it's happening. Could she be incontinent?

A: Yes, Sandy could be urinary incontinent, and it is more likely to occur in females than males. To investigate this, your veterinarian will need more information.

Pets suspected of urinary incontinence should have a thorough history taken, physical exam performed and urinalysis. Urinary tract infections and/or bladder stones can occur, and your veterinarian will want to rule that out. Based on those results, your veterinarian may speak to you about a urine culture, blood tests and potentially X-rays or ultrasounds of the bladder/kidneys.

Age is an important consideration. Middleaged and older dogs are more likely to have incontinence compared to puppies and young adults. If Sandy is spayed, she could have developed an estrogen responsive urinary incontinence. There is

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





"I believe that seeing the joy from others pushes me to always want to find the best solution for every problem,"

Deckard said. "Thus, I believe that civil engineering will allow me to take my childhood passion of building to help me achieve my desire of helping others."

However, he recalled he was not surprised at the news.

"We get our game challenge in January," Lawrie said. "From that point, basically, stu-

dents have to build everything from scratch. That's software, that's electronics, that's game planning, that's getting practice in with the robot. "We then attend tourna-

ments, where we compete against other teams usually from all over the Southeast, but we also have international teams we compete against, as well, in regional tournaments," she added.

This past season, the Webb team competed in Smoky Mountain Regional Competition in Knoxville Coliseum on April 1 and the Rocket City event in Huntsville, Alabama, April 5-8.

"The team did really well at Smoky Mountain," Lawrie said. "They ranked third but were knocked out in the playoffs a little earlier than they were hoping to."

Still, "they were pretty excited about that (third place designation before the playoffs)," she added.

Additionally, the team won a Robot Design Quality Award at Smoky Mountain "for a robust, well-designed robot," Lawrie said.

"It was a great thing to pick up a technical award at an event," she added. However, "we qualified for the World Champi-

onship ... at Rocket City Regional. At Rocket City, "the team ranked second over-

all out of 51 teams," Lawrie said. "It went into the playoffs pretty strong and made it to the fi-"They played a double elimination bracket,"

As a finalist in the Alabama competition, the team qualified for the World Championships.

Webb started its robotics program during the 2003-04 school year. "This is our 20th robot the teams have built

in our 20th year in competition," Lawrie said. "We definitely think this has been a highlight year for us. "This is strongest robot the team has ever

built," she added. "They've been pretty proud Webb has won regional competitions over the

years, but placing among top teams worldwide is a "tall order," Lawrie said. "The last year we attended the World Championships was 2018.' Along with the FIRST high school team, the

school has four other robotics teams: FIRST Tech Challenge (team) with smaller scale robots (mostly seventh and eighth graders) and three FIRST Lego League teams for students in grades four to eight.

Lifelong treatment is typical. Depending on the problem, surgery may be an option if medical therapy fails.

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

All the while, the event benefitted Remote Area Medical, which provides free medical, dental and vision care to people living in remote areas.


