\$1.3 million for Knox Co. broadband announced by Briggs, GOP Caucus

State Sen. Richard Briggs (R-District 7, including Farragut) was among Knoxville area General Assembly lawmakers announcing earlier this week the awarding of four major grants from Tennessee Department of Economic and Community Development, adding up to more than \$1.3 million, to expand broadband to unserved communities in Knox County.

To promote broadband opportunity and highpaying digital jobs, TNECD launched four new programs during this funding opportunity: Digital Skills, Employment and Workforce Development, Connected Community Facilities,

Broadband Ready Communities and Tennessee College of Applied Technology Broadband Workforce grants.

'Those without access to broadband are at a significant disadvantage for education, commerce and connectivity," Briggs said. "These grants will help meet the needs of Knox County citizens still lacking access to broadband. I am grateful to ECD and Gov. (Bill) Lee for their

"The BRC grants are being distributed to local governments and support community-based digital skills training, public Wi-Fi projects, distribution of free or low-cost devices and mar-

Park Place Men of Valor stories told; Kirk all about quilts

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"It's about the veterans," Dixie Lee Hands Touching Hearts quilting group president Paula Kirk said about presenting Quilts of Valor to seven veterans at Park Place of West Knoxville, 10914 Kingston Pike in Farragut, Wednesday, April 24.

Charles "Chuck" Firestone, Larry Goulding, Robert Hungate, Dennis Larrabee, Phil Malkovich, Alvin "Al" Sherrill and Wilfred "Will" Slade each came in front of fellow Park Place residents and family to receive their quilts.

As a member of Quilts of Valor Foundation, Dixie Lee Hands Touching Hearts group near Farragut makes quilts to drape over the shoulders of local veterans, but Kirk said she wants the focus entirely on the veterans.

'We all know that freedom is not free," she said. "While we will never know the true extent of your service and sacrifice, we do know that we owe a debt that we can never repay to you and all those who have served.

"The Quilts of Valor Foundation is a national organization founded by Blue Star Mother Catherine Roberts after her son was deployed to Iraq," she added.


"She had an idea to make and give a quilt to a wounded soldier,

One of 29 in U.S.: Town teen earns WC Foundation Scholarship

Connor Archer of Farragut, Knoxville

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Christian School homeschool program Class of 2024 graduate, recently won a national Washington Crossing Foundation 2024 Scholarship designated for seniors planning careers in government service.

Archer, who will attend Liberty University in Lynchburg, Virginia, in the fall, received the Gregory Czura, Esq., Memorial Scholarship through the Washington Crossing Foundation. He was among 29 seniors nationwide to receive the schol-

"It was a huge honor to receive the scholarship," said Archer, who graduated from KCS Friday, May 3.

"The prestigious scholarships are awarded annually to patriotic high school seniors dedicated to serving their school, their community and their country," a Washington Crossing press release stat-

"This quality of service is exemplified by Gen. Washington and his men in their heroic Crossing of the Delaware on Christmas night 1776," the release further stated.

The scholarships were presented during a ceremony and luncheon at Washington Crossing Inn in Washington Crossing, Pennsylvania.

"Over the course of the weekend, specifically during the ceremony, I met a

lot of extraordinary people who are currently leaders in their communities and industries, as well as people who are rising to that level and will be leaders in the future," said Archer, son of Dr. Daniel

and Keri Archer. "One of the things that past recipients and other people involved with the Washington Crossing Foundation said numerous times ... was that a major component of what the scholarship offers comes from the connections that it offers its recipients rather than the monetary value of the scholarship," he added. "I don't think I would have believed them if I had not been at the scholarship weekend, but

I can now see that I will have a lifetime of connections arising from this award, which will be of far greater worth to me in the long run than the monetary value of the scholarship."

Archer is involved with his church — Christ Covenant — "especially in the youth group, where I am the team lead for all the tech relating to worship (sound, slides, etc.)."

He also is involved in a discipleship group at the church, where he has had the opportunity over his high school years "to learn from and be mentored by older men in the church," he said.

"I have had the privilege of serving on multiple short-term mission trips, where I have been stretched as a person and learned the importance of serving the community around me," Archer added. "I also participated in TeenPact, a Christian Government/ Leadership school, where I got to participate in a mock legislature and much more."

Outside of church and school, Archer is part of a competitive shooting team, N2Dust Shotgun Sports — which is part of the Scholastic Clay Target Program — through which he has competed in skeet, trap and sporting clays.

"I also spent many years playing in a recreational baseball league," he said.

At Liberty University, Archer will study mechanical engineering and has been accepted into its Honors Program.

"I am not entirely sure what I want to do in the field of engineering after college, but I think it could be very interesting to work in research and development, specifically on aircraft," he said. "I have also considered trying to do some sort of research for the government or serving my country in some other capacity."

keting for low-cost Internet plans," according to a press release from Virginia McFarland, deputy press secretary for Tennessee Senate Republican Caucus.

"The DSEW grants are being distributed to organizations that will offer a variety of training and education programs to advance digital skills and workforce development, creating a pipeline for well-paying digital jobs," the release further stated.

Digital Skills, Education and Workforce grant recipients: Knoxville-Knox County Community Action Committee, \$500,000, serving parts of Knox County; Shora Foundation, \$204,385, serving parts of Knox County; and University of Tennessee, \$512,916, serving parts of Knox and 20 other East Tennessee counties.

"Grantees across all programs are investing matching funds and will complete their projects by Dec. 31, 2026," the release further stated.

Applications for the second round of CCF and BRC programs will open Wednesday, May 15, and the DSEW program will open June 15.

Another key local figure in the political process of broadband to Knox County was state Sen. Becky Massey (R-District 6, Knox County).

hoping to offer healing and comfort

The mission of the foundation "has grown and changed from that early day," Kirk said. "At the heart of the foundation's mission is the thought of giving something back to veterans who have served our country with honor and to thank them for their service.

"As of Feb. 29, 377,384 Quilts of Valor have been presented."

Park Place veterans' stories are told

Firestone served from 1964 to 1967, when he was a first lieutenant in the U.S. Army. After being commissioned, he served as a field artillery officer with the 173rd Airborne Brigade as a member of the Long-Range Recon Patrol team.

"The 173rd Airborne Division was the first major United States Army ground formation deployed to Vietnam," Kirk said.

During his service, Firestone received a Bronze Star; 2-Oak Leaf Clusters, for which he was thrice awarded; a Purple Heart; and Republic of Vietnam Gallantry Cross with Silver Star.

Besides serving in Vietnam, he also served as an instructor at Fort Sill Artillery School.

"He credits his military service for allowing him to be very decisive and live for today," Kirk said of Firestone.

However, "Chuck asks that we all understand PTSD can be a lifelong problem, and we always support our returning veterans with that condition no matter how long it takes to be corrected."

Goulding served in the U.S. Army from 1954 to 1956, when he was specialist third class.

"While in the Army, Larry served as a clerk historian during the Korean War and served in Germany," Kirk said.

"The most memorable experience was spending Christ-

mas Eve in a small German

"Military life enabled me to see Europe and receive many benefits thanks to Uncle Sam," Goulding said. "It was a satisfying growth experience."

Hungate, who comes from a military family, served in the U.S. Army from 1968 to 1974, when he was an E-4 specialist. Like is father, he also served as a 91 Bravo medic.

In service, he was stationed in West Germany, where he had the "unexpected privilege of delivering a baby for a U.S. military family not once, but twice," Kirk said.

Hungate recalled how the Army restricted the news he received while in West Germany. "In 1969, there was plenty of news about the moon landing, but not a word about Woodstock," he shared.

Larrabee served in the U.S. Coast Guard from 1966 to 1988, when he was senior chief (E-8), serving as a machinery tech during the Vietnam War.

However, his most memorable tours were in Alaska and cocswain training in Lake Erie.

"Military life enabled me to make long-time friends and have a sense of community," Larrabee said. "I also felt I was part of something important."

Malkovich served in the U.S. Navy from 1952 to 1960, when he was a PO2 and served as a quarter master during the Korean War.

His most memorable experience was "the beauty of the sunsets on the quiet ocean," Malkovich shared.

While in the Navy, it offered him a world cruise through the Panama and Suez canals. Also, he said military life enabled him to attend college.

"I would certainly do it all over again," he added.

Sherrill served in the U.S. Army from 1954 to 1956, where he was private first class.

He was drafted while married and living in Old Hickory (Davidson County).

"After going through basic training at Fort Knox, Kentucky, he said goodbye to his wife and was shipped out to Darmstadt, Germany, to serve as a clerk typist," Kirk said. "During his 18 months in Germany, he was afforded only one weekend pass.

"However, he did get to make many day trips to nearby cities and towns," she added.

After being honorably discharged, Sherrill used the GI Bill to finish his college education, earning a Bachelor of Arts degree in accounting from Carson-Newman University. He then served as an IRS agent for 31 years.

Slade served in the U.S. Air Force from 1951 to 1971, where

he was a technical sergeant. While in the Air Force, he served as an aircraft and engine mechanic.

He served a year in Vietnam, Korea and the Philippines. In the United States, he was stationed at various bases, including Edwards AFB, Los Angeles AFB and Wright-Patterson AFB.

"His most memorable experiences come from his time while stationed at Wright-Patterson AFB for four years and in the Philippines for three-and-a-half years," Kirk said.

"He appreciates how his service in the Air Force kept his life interesting and instilled the value of respect," she added about Slade.

Sponsors sought for series addressing childcare crisis in Farragut, Knox Co.

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Farragut West Knox Chamber of Commerce is helping businesses look at solutions to the childcare crisis in Farragut and Knox County with its upcoming Breakfast Speaker Series.


The breakfast starts at 7:30 a.m., followed by a panel discussion of speakers at 8 a.m., expected to end at 9 a.m., Wednesday, June 5, with featured speakers, Matt Ryerson, CEO, United Way of Greater Knoxville; Bart McFadden, CEO, Boys & Girls Club of Tennessee Valley; and state Sen. Becky Massey (R-District 6).

"We talk to employers and working parents every single week who tell us how hard it is to find good, affordable daycare options, and this conversation, unfortunately, has not changed

much over the last several years," FWKCC president/CEO Julie Blaylock said. "Many new parents have been on waiting lists since they found out they were having a baby—sometimes even before that.

"If parents can find daycare availability, the next issue is the expense," she added. "And, while daycare costs have risen exorbitantly, the tax credit cap to offset childcare costs hasn't changed since the 1980s.

For example, "One of our volunteers recently shared that they opted for their spouse to stay at home to care for the kids



"Many have had working parents take leave to have a child and then don't come back, either because they're still on a waiting list or they realize the expense is too high," she added. "Employers and employees both talk about being short-staffed because school closed early or closed entirely last minute and there are no last-minute childcare options available.

"Then you have industries who operate outside a normal Monday through Friday workday schedule. Those parents are even more challenged to find childcare that accommodates that schedule"

Blaylock hopes the Breakfast Speaker Series will give "a much louder voice to the issue; let members of our business community share their challenges and hopefully understand how they

can support solutions at the legislative level, but also get creative in being part of the solution locally.

"Until we started seeing massive workforce gaps, it's a problem that I think got dismissed as something just parents needed to figure out," she added. "But it's not just the parents' problem; it is all of our problem."

According to the website for Tennesseans for Quality Early Education — a statewide, bipartisan nonprofit organization — the impact of inadequate child care on Tennessee parents, businesses and taxpayers amounts to \$122 million annually in lost earnings and revenue.

"Talk to most Knoxville parents of children under age 5, and you're likely to hear how difficult it is to find child care that's accessible, affordable and of sufficient quality to support their child's school readiness," the website stated.

"An overwhelming 94 percent of Knoxville parents said inadequate child care hurt

their work productivity and/ or career opportunities," the website further stated. "Productivity challenges affect both employer and employee."

Cost to attend the event is \$35 for Chamber members, \$40 for non-members and \$350 for a table of 10 with logo. Tickets can be purchased online by visiting farragutchamber.com

shot made it 19-2.



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




















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\$5k TVA grant earned by FIS STEM teacher

Farragut Intermediate School STEM teacher Kristi Shedden has received a \$5,000 Tennessee Valley Authority STEM Classroom Grant for 2024, allowing her students to develop engineering projects using a 3D printer.

Shedden and some of her students showed what they learned to TVA and Knox County officials while the teacher accepted the \$5,000 check from TVA at the school Thursday, May 9.

"I am so excited to have received this grant," Shedden said. "It gives my students so many more opportunities to experience STEM firsthand."

The teacher was notified in November 2023 that she was chosen as one of the TVA/Battelle \$5,000 STEM grant recipients.

"Once notified, I invited the students to start coming before school around Thanksgiving to continue learning how to use the website Tinkercad. com for 3D design," she said.

"The 3D printers arrived

April 4, and the students were ready to try out their designs," Shedden added. "We had a lot of opportunities to learn from and they persevered. I am so proud of them."

Students showed how they can use the 3D printers to demonstrate different types of power: wind, solar and water.

They also described what they learned about the printers when projects did not go as planned. For example, one student, Lucinda Varsas, related how a water wheel "got a little damaged because a piece of filament broke off, so we're using an old water wheel for some practice."

This STEM classroom grant program is operated in partnership with Tennessee STEM Innovation Network, managed by Battelle organization, the release stated.

The grant came about when TVA partnered with Bicentennial Volunteers Inc., a TVA retiree organization, to award a record \$1.5 million in grants to educators in public schools to develop science, technology. engineering and math projects across the Tennessee Valley

"My recognition as salutatorian is a culmination of my dedication and diligence throughout the past 13 years," he added. "It also serves as a motivator going forward, as I have a long academic pathway to a career in medicine."

Khan, son of Seema and Shah Khan, plans to pursue a career in interventional cardiology. "I will be attending the University of Tennessee, Knoxville, where I plan to major in biochemistry and cellular and molecular biology in

the Chancellor's Honors Program." he said.

"I am ultimately hopeful to combat healthcare disparities by offering quality care to low-income and uninsured patients," Khan added.

"I wish to follow in the footsteps of my sister, Aruha Khan, whose faithfulness to health equity has stimulated my pursuit of a medical career.'

In summer 2022, Khan received a fully funded merit scholarship to attend the Governor's School for the Sciences and Engineering at UTK.

Additionally, he is completing an internship as a student learning mentor at Brickey-McCloud Elementary School for the Gear Up 4 STEM program, where he assists in the setup and orchestration of science-related demonstrations to grow students' passion in STEM disciplines.

Childcare Crisis is Critical




For working parents, the lack of childcare that they can afford and that supports their child's school readiness is critically low-and that's if they can find childcare at all.

A 2019 report by the Tennesseeans for Quality Early Education (TQEE) showed that while the issue is both a state and nationwide one, the Knoxville area alone suffers \$122M in economic losses annually. Parents and parental custodians report that for 73% of them, sheer access to childcare is the biggest obstacle, with affordability (71%) and quality (61%) being top issues as well.

Compounding this issue is the impact to the workforce, still a critical struggle post-pandemic for many businesses in our area. Almost 50% of parents surveyed in 2019 said they had to turn down a new job or promotion, while 32% had to reduce hours or go part-time, and another 28% reported having to quit or were fired/demoted.

Locally we lose \$122 million per year due to insufficient child care options.

There are many options; home-based, a brick and mortar, afterschool, drop-in centers, education based programs, the list goes on and on.
