### Annual Independence Day Parade, Freedom Run approaching

Town staff and volunteers are readying for Farragut 35th Annual Independence Day Parade, set to begin at 9:30 a.m. Tuesday, July 4.

After 34 years under the guidance of former Town Park & Recreation director Sue Stuhl, who retired earlier this year, this will be the first year under new Park & Rec director Ron Oestreich.

"My predecessor did an amazing job organizing this over the years," he said. "All I have had to do is read over her notes and follow the project plan she developed.

"It really is like a well-oiled machine."

Oestreich also credits the former and continued assistance from Public Works direc-

tor Bud McKelvey and his staff.

"Bud is a wealth of information, and he and I have driven the route and parking lots in preparation of the parade," he said. "He has been a great help."

As this event "is one of our largest of the year, it is all hands on deck, between our full-time and part-time Park and Rec and Public Works employees, along with about 50 volunteers," who will be working the event.

Oestreich said setup and staging will take place Monday, July 3, in the Farragut

### New entertainment complex is coming to West Knoxville

Prosperity Crossing, a sports entertainment complex featuring hotels, restaurants, retail and apartments currently is under way for West Knox County.

Grading is taking place on the 230-acre complex at the southwest corner of Watt Road, across from Flying J Travel Center and just outside of Farragut, according to Steve Maddox, president and owner of Maddox Companies, which include Maddox Property Management and Sales,

Maddox Construction and Maddox Development Companies.

The crew broke ground in February, but he said there will be an official groundbreaking in September.

Currently, Maddox said excavation and earthwork are being performed, which he expects will take 12 months: some utilities are being installed; others are being designed; and engineering on the overall site has been done. The next stage will be to complete installation of the utilities and the roads at the same time the apartments and ballfields are being constructed.

Then, as the roads are finished, he said the hotels, medical offices and other build-

ings will start being built. Contrary to earlier reports about the development, Maddox said it will be anchored by a 12-field sports complex.

"I think it was quoted that the development is going to have apartments at the top and a bunch of offices," he said, then clarified, "It's going to have zero offices other than medical.

"Retail, yes; grocery store, no; a whole-

### BOMA tackles \$5.5 million land purchase June 22 STAFF REPORTS

A proposal to consider purchasing 55 acres off McFee Road for \$5.5 million as potential Town park land will be on the Board of mayor and Aldermen agenda this Thursday, June 22.

Under business items, approval of a letter of intent to purchase the property and approval of a professional services agreement with Cannon & Cannon Inc., "for due diligence investigation" the property are listed on the agenda.

The property is described as "being adjacent to the railroad track, and located on the Knox County Tax Map 24.02 and 24.03," and the cost to the

Town would be \$5.5 million. According to background support described in documentation for the agenda item, "The Town of Farragut has four main park facilities ... more open space, parks and town greenways are always high on the list of citizens requests each time we update our parks and recreation master plan.

"Currently, the Town has no additional acreage to grow and enhance our park facilities ... and [officials/staff] have been in discussion with the Scott family about the potential pur-

"To coincide with the purchase of the 55 acres of land, the Scott family would then

donate 15 acres of land, which would give the town a total of 70 acres of property for this

Additionally, the LOI "would include a restrictive covenant that the property is to only be used for governmental, conservation or park purposes. No building on the donated parcel could have more than a 6,000 square foot footprint and all buildings could not exceed

12,000 square feet." The Town would also agree to plant a landscape buffer, "in accordance with Town buffer regulations," and "a final condition for the donated tract is that a 50-foot access easement be granted across the donated

After 25 years of volunteering with the Town, of whichshe served 17 years on the Farragut Municipal Planning Commission 17 years -Chairman Rita Holladay has decided "it's time" to retire.

FMPC members and Town staff recognized Holladav's contributions during a reception honoring her before the FMPC meeting Thursday, June 15.

As she plans to move on, she said time with family was a major consideration for retirement.

"We have three grandchildren here, in Bearden and two in Atlanta," Holladay said. "Whatever they're doing, we

### Northshore homeowners pleased with planned upgrades

Northshore Drive homeowners, concerned with the roadway's safety, are pleased a suggested \$1 million in Knox County-funded upgrades are slated for implementation later this calendar year.

Bayou Bend HOA president Ed Mee and Jack Shafe, Montgomery Cove HOA president, along with Angela Russell, treasurer of Bayou Bend HOA, have been leading a group of about a dozen HOAs in asking for evaluation and potential solutions for Northshore Drive since early this year.

"Just since February, we started contacting area HOAs," said Russell. "We have 12 on our distribution list and seven who have actively attended one of our two meetings. So we are trying to get a group together so we can coordinator our efforts, in order to reach and educate our elected officials about what is going on down here."

They were initially spurred into action by the ongoing Pedestrian Safety project, which has been spearheaded by Knox County Commissioner at large Larsen Jay (11th District).

"Our fear has been they were going to spend money on a walking trail that goes right along side the road, and not focus on the road," said Russell, describing Northshore as "narrow and in many places does not have even a shoulder.

"A walking trail is more of a recreational luxury, but the road itself is a necessity," she added. "People's lives should be the priority. People on a walking trail have a choice, if it's dangerous or not dangerous, but we don't have a choice. We only have one way to go to work, only one way to pick up food, only one way for

medical attention and only one way for police officers to come and protect us if we need them to."

"The safety issue is our main concern," agreed Shafe, who said his HOA spends thousands of dollars a year in front entrance repairs due to car accidents.

Discussions about the issue with Knox County Commissioner John Schoonmaker (5th District) earlier this spring led to conversations with Knox County Mayor Glenn Jacobs and Jim Snowden, Knox County's senior director of engineering and public works.

"I met with Jacobs, and he was very enthusiastic about helping make this a priority," said Schoonmaker, who also inspected specific areas of Northshore with Snowden to see what could be accom-

Recent state funding specifically earmarked for roadways will be utilized for the Northshore improvements, according to Mike Donila, senior director of communications for Knox County.

"We will be using approximately \$1 million from the recent state aid one-time infusion of \$8.2 million," he said. "For context, we normally get \$500,000 to \$600,000 annually in state aid, so we are getting a very large increase.

"Our recent investigation of Northshore Drive showed the road carried an average of 15,000 cars per day and had a pavement width of 21 to 22 feet, with little or no shoulders. The result of these conditions is errored road sides with drop offs immediately adjacent to the white line.

"In addition, due to the lake, we have no redundancy or alternate route that can provide relief should a wreck occur.

"As such, we have been monitoring this location for some time, but as part of the recent priority's week of Advance Knox the public overwhelmingly recognized this need Therefore, the Mayor and Commissioner Schoonmaker have asked EPW to make safety improvements to this segment.

"These improvements will include widening of the road by 4 to 5 feet, repaving, and

"He was chairman (of FMPC) since the start of it," Holladay recalled. "He was an engineer in Oak Ridge. He had a good background for all of this.







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

I am concerned and confused with Town of Farragut's Board of Mayor and Alderman's sense of urgency and lack of significant public outreach regarding the large plot of land off McFee that recently became available when Knox County pulled out of their purchase of the same property.

My understanding is much of the land is outside of the TOF borders in Loudon County. Why is TOF BOMA so intent on spending approximately five million more dollars on a park/ ballfields on the edge of Town that will be more convenient for Loudon County residents than many TOF residents?

Why does TOF BOMA have a fever to spend \$50k on a recent survey to learn nothing about the TOF Strategic Plan, and yet where SPO would be useful they sneak around in the shadows as if there is something to hide?

Why is TOF spending a significant amount of money for an amorphous future when we have severe traffic problems now, especially near Biddle Farm and the schools?

Another consideration is the plans for Prosperity Park off Watt Road that will include ballfields. That will definitely be used for the community at large and won't cost TOF a penny.

It seems to me it would be more prudent to invest in the future I-40/Campbell Station exchange (it is more concrete, pun intended), the expansion of Kingston Pike/Campbell Station interchange without 10-foot lanes or the oftenand over-promised ATMS that will benefit most TOF residents than to pursue the purchase of this land.

sale club, no," Maddox said. "Hotel convention facilities, yes; and a bunch of other retail and outdoors fitters, yes — but the main point of the development is the sports center.

"We've got it designed for 12 multi-use, all-turf, lighted fields with all the amenities, plenty of parking, restrooms and concessions. "The fields can be used for

soccer, rugby, lacross, football," he said. "They can also be turned cornerwise and be used for baseball and softball.

"What makes ours unique is seven of the fields and then five of the fields are all going

to be on one plane — one level — so that they're basically one sheet of turf, from one end to the other so that you can move them and do anything with them that needs to be done," Maddox said. "We've also had interest for archery and just all kinds of different uses.

"The construction has begun," he said. "They will be starting construction on the fields starting later this fall."

Seating capacity for the fields will be up to operators of the fields, according to Maddox. However, he said there would probably be at least 100 seats per field.

"That's 1,200 or more seating capacity," he added.

Along with sports, Maddox

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

 $\mathbf{A}^{\mathrm{bdul}}$  Freeman has a fish story to tell, and the pictures to prove it.

The Norwood resident, who fishes frequently in Fort Loudoun Lake waters around Concord Park, caught a 40-pound catfish on Memorial Day, Monday, May 29.

The haul was so large, two young men assisted in the eventual catch.

"I fish in the Concord Park area all the time," Freeman said. "This particular night, I was at the Concord fishing pier nearest to the kayak launch. I wasn't on the pier because people (were) there when I arrived.

"Time was going by quickly. Finally after a couple hours I get my first catch. A striped bass. It was small—too small to even take a picture of," he added, noting his model is "Catch, pose and release."

Then his second catch came and it was a skipjack — from which he used the head for bait.

Then, just as Freeman least expected it, the big fish came along.

"When it hit, the drag on the pole took off," he recalled. "(Two) young men heard it all the way on the pier. One of them hollered 'You got a big one.' Before I knew it, I had a growing audience.

"For five to seven minutes, it pulled me and I pulled it."

The young men came to his aid as he wrangled the fish and brought it up out of the water.

"I have to say, this catch was indeed my biggest yet," Freeman said. "Forty pounds, and had those two young men not been there I don't know how I would of gotten that fish in. But, thanks to them, an amazing show was put on.

"Memories that will last a lifetime happen while fishing," he continued. "Those two young men face-timed their dad and friends to show them this big cat. We all took turns taking pictures of it, then released it back into the water.

"A grandfather and his granddaughter(s) were even present. The grandfather asked me about the bait that I used to catch it with, and I told him it was skip jack. And that's when he told me who he was with, trying to make memories

"So, since I was leaving, I gave him the rest of the minnows I had left and exchanged a few pleasantries with him and continued packing up."

Freeman said he makes the 20-minute trip to Concord Park frequently. It also serves as a welcome respite, as his

It also serves as a welcome respite, as his daughter, Aleina, 3, has been battling cancer at East Tennessee Children's Hospital.


"She's in remission now — shout out to the wonderful staff at Children's Hospital," he said. "My Aleina is a soldier. And spoiled rotten.

"A lot of times I'd leave from the hospital and go to Concord Boat launch area," he added. "Most times, I'd fish; but sometimes I'd just sit out there listening to the water and watching the stars and clouds. My first large catfish, I caught here after a hospital visit.

"Fishing helps me maintain my sanity and work on my patience. I recommend everyone try it. Especially if life has you cornered."



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

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

what I try to do."

A graduate of Christian Academy of Knoxville, Gregory learned about football as a manager for the team and began broadcasting baseball, basketball, lacrosse, soccer and softball for CAK's Warrior Network, which is part of the NFHS Network that broadcasting high school sports nationally. His work led to being named his senior year as a top-three finalist for best high school sportscaster in the nation.

His WUTM 90.3 "The Hawk" student broadcasting debuts were anything but perfect, as he pushed through a sinus infection during the Westview football game. Then, for the SIU Carbondale game, a different challenge emerged – a case of nerves. His broadcast partner, fellow student John Thornton, advised him to calm down, "And once I got through the first couple minutes and first couple drives, I calmed down a whole lot more," he remembered. "But I definitely was a very, very nervous broadcaster going into that first (college) game.'

Gregory's broadcasting world expanded as a member of WUTM's "The Bench" sports talk show team. The show primarily covers UT Martin sports but ventures into news and conversations about the sports world in general. He learned quickly that engaging sports talk is "not about just getting in front of

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the mic and talking.

"It's about the prep work that you have to do for an hour show," he added. "You've got to spend definitely more than an hour prepping and make sure that it's a good show. ... There's so much that goes on behind the scenes."

He also credited UT, Martin, alum John Hatler, Skyhawk football play-by-play announcer, for making him a better member of the talk show team.

"I remember my sophomore year, it was really tough for me because that was the first year of (being WUTM) sports director and getting stuff together. (I was) really stressed out and felt like I wasn't being myself and talking enough on the show like a conversation."

As a show guest that year, Hatler helped Gregory relax and enjoy the conversations that make sports talk shows popular.

While "The Bench" allowed him to expand his talents, playby-play remains Gregory's primary focus, and his classes, teachers and on-air experiences strengthened important skills. "I think the biggest thing is improving my vocabulary and not saying the same thing over and over again," he said. "... You need to have different ways of describing the moment, and that's probably been one of the biggest things to overcome and get better at as a broadcaster."

Gregory's work hasn't gone unnoticed. He has been a part of two "Best College Radio Station in the South" recognitions in 2022-23 by the South-

east Journalism Conference for WUTM 90.3 "The Hawk." Gregory also was part of the ESPN+ crew that won the 2021-22 "OVC Call of the Year" award from the Ohio Valley Conference for his call on a homerun during a Skyhawk baseball game. He closed out his senior year by receiving the Outstanding Senior Award for broadcasting from the Department of Mass Media and Strategic Communication.

Thanks to hard work and perseverance, Gregory enters the competitive sports broadcasting profession with his bachelor's degree plus seven valuable years of broadcasting experience. An entrylevel position in radio that offers an opportunity to call games might be next. Farther down the road, he dreams of broadcasting major sports events, and he'll pursue his dream "as long as God wants

me to pursue it."

Proper technique also is important, and he learned about speaking through his chest instead of through his throat from Dr. Richard Robinson, professor and WUTM adviser.

"Davis has learned a lot, and whoever hires him will be lucky to get a young, talented broadcaster who will do an exceptional job," Robinson wrote. "He has great potential as a sports broadcast talent."

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





located behind the large pavilion next to the splashpad, is already open for use. Tennova Healthcare donated \$50,000 to the Town of Farragut to help finance construction



### A quick guide to rain gardens

Rain gardens are a valuable landscaping feature that can provide several benefits to both the environment and property owners. These gardens help improve water quality, reduce stormwater runoff and flooding and provide aesthetic and functional value to a property. Designing and installing a rain garden is a simple process that can be done by property owners with basic landscaping knowledge. The following are design considerations and ideas for designing your own rain garden! For more information, including example planting plans and a list of recommended plants, visit the Tennessee Smart Yards website by clicking the QR code on the photo.

Location: The rain garden should be located near a significant source of runoff such as a downspout or driveway. It should be at least 10 feet away from your structure to prevent water collection along the foundation. It's best to locate it

in a flat or low spot in your yard with the lowest point being the center of the rain garden.

Size: The best rule is to make

Size: The best rule is to make the rain garden 10% of the contributing runoff area from a roof or driveway. For example, if the roof area connected to the downspout is 200 sq feet, your garden should be 20 sq feet. The garden should be designed with rounded edges following the contour lines of your space for optimal capture and drainage. Most gardens will look like a kidney bean or teardrop shape.

Excavation: After marking your rain garden area, dig out the area to a maximum of 4-6 inches deep creating a flat-bottom bowl with sloping sides. The lowest point along the garden rim will serve as an emergency spillway, so keep that in mind when designing.

**Planting:** Plants should be native to East Tennessee and tolerant of wet conditions.

Place the most water-loving plants in the center and slowly transition to less water-loving plants as you move up the sides of the bowl. There are many plant options out there with a range of availability, but we recommend including blue-flag iris in the wettest zone and a native grass such as big blue stem in the drier areas. Consider the mature size of the plants. Generally you want to stick to grasses, flowers, and small shrubs.

Maintenance: After planting, spread a one-inch layer of mulch over the rain garden, being careful not to smother any of your new plants. The mulch will help protect the new plants and break up water droplets to increase drainage. You may notice over time that your turf grass begins to creep back into the garden area; it is important to keep it out because turf grass forms a shallow root mat which decreases drainage capacity and rate.

- Antique car participants: Plan on arriving at the high



school before 8 a.m. to avoid long lines and overheating your car. There is no special entrance or accommodation for antique cars, so please arrive early.

- Large floats may be taken to the line-up area at the junior lot at Farragut High School any time after 5 p.m. on Monday, July 3. A guard will be on duty from 5 p.m. until the parade on July 4.
- Giveaways: No candy or giveaways may be thrown from floats or cars. Walkers may distribute these and other free items along the side of the road during the parade. Children younger than 9 must ride (not walk) during the parade.
- All parade participants must be picked up at the Farragut Towne Square parking lot (former Ingles shopping center).

### A quick guide to rain gardens

Rain gardens are a valuable landscaping feature that can provide several benefits to both the environment and property owners. These gardens help improve water quality, reduce stormwater runoff and flooding and provide aesthetic and functional value to a property. Designing and installing a rain garden is a simple process that can be done by property owners with basic landscaping knowledge. The following are design considerations and ideas for designing your own rain garden! For more information, including example planting plans and a list of recommended plants, visit the Tennessee Smart Yards website by clicking the QR code on the photo. *Location:* The rain garden

should be located near a significant source of runoff such as a downspout or driveway. It should be at least 10 feet away from your structure to prevent water collection along the foundation. It's best to locate it

in a flat or low spot in your yard with the lowest point being the center of the rain garden.

Size: The best rule is to make the rain garden 10% of the contributing runoff area from a roof or driveway. For example, if the roof area connected to the downspout is 200 sq feet, your garden should be 20 sq feet. The garden should be designed with rounded edges following the contour lines of your space for optimal capture and drainage. Most gardens will look like a kidney bean or teardrop shape.

Excavation: After marking your rain garden area, dig out the area to a maximum of 4-6 inches deep creating a flat-bottom bowl with sloping sides. The lowest point along the garden rim will serve as an emergency spillway, so keep that in mind when designing.

**Planting:** Plants should be native to East Tennessee and tolerant of wet conditions.

Place the most water-loving plants in the center and slowly transition to less water-loving plants as you move up the sides of the bowl. There are many plant options out there with a range of availability, but we recommend including blue-flag iris in the wettest zone and a native grass such as big blue stem in the drier areas. Consider the mature size of the plants. Generally you want to stick to grasses, flowers, and small shrubs.

Maintenance: After planting, spread a one-inch layer of mulch over the rain garden, being careful not to smother any of your new plants. The mulch will help protect the new plants and break up water droplets to increase drainage. You may notice over time that your turf grass begins to creep back into the garden area; it is important to keep it out because turf grass forms a shallow root mat which decreases drainage capacity and rate.



### Independence Day Parade participant rules

The Town of Farragut's Independence Day Parade starts at 9:30 a.m. on Tuesday, July 4, and parade participants are required to follow the following guidelines:

- Parade participants should arrive at Farragut High School no later than 8:30 a.m. on Tuesday, July 4. Access to the high school is available from Campbell Station Road, West End Boulevard and Lendon Welch Way (the road next to the stadiums).
- Only parade vehicles will be allowed to enter the parade line-up area. Older children and adults may be dropped off on the circle drive or on the drive to the Farragut Middle School. Those participating in the parade or those with small children will need to park in the circle parking lot at the high school or the parking lot at the middle school. Parade line-up numbers will be available on the Farragut Parks & Recreation website, farragutparksandrec.org, and posted on the Farragut Community Center front door by 8 a.m. on Friday, June 30. Line-up numbers will not be available by phone.
- Antique car participants: Plan on arriving at the high



school before 8 a.m. to avoid long lines and overheating your car. There is no special entrance or accommodation for antique cars, so please arrive early.

- Large floats may be taken to the line-up area at the junior lot at Farragut High School any time after 5 p.m. on Monday, July 3. A guard will be on duty from 5 p.m. until the parade on July 4.
- Giveaways: No candy or giveaways may be thrown from floats or cars. Walkers may distribute these and other free items along the side of the road during the parade. Children younger than 9 must ride (not walk) during the parade.
- All parade participants must be picked up at the Farragut Towne Square parking lot (former Ingles shopping center).

### Independence Day Parade Road Closure

Due to the Independence Day Parade, Kingston Pike from Lendon Welch Way to Federal Boulevard will be closed from 8:30 a.m. to approximately noon on Tuesday, July 4.

Detours: north side - Campbell Station Road to Grigsby Chapel Road to Smith Road to Kingston Pike (going west) or Campbell Station Road to Parkside Drive to Lovell Road (going east) and south side - Concord Road to Turkey Creek Road to Virtue Road to Kingston Pike.
