Skeptical voices on Hy-Vee; some supporters

A variety of questions and statements — many expressed with skepticism — targeted the Hy-Vee, Inc. supermarket chain's proposed location in Farragut on roughly 68 acres fronting Kingston Pike, just west of the Pike's intersection with Campbell Station Road.

"We have 10 grocery stores within a 1.3-mile radius

of my house, most of which I can walk to," said one resident, among roughly 70 attending a community meeting with Hy-Vee officials in Town of Farragut Community Center Thursday evening, June 16, which heavily included residents from subdivisions near the proposed site of this Des Moines, Iowa-based chain.

"... We may need more walking parks; make it a recreational area," she added. "This is the last open area, grassland (potential) park, that has not been demolished by (Town of) Farragut.'

As for anticipated increased vehicular traffic, another resident said, "It is very difficult to get in and out of the existing businesses and the subdivisions as it is now," as residents attended from subdivisions near the proposed location, including Glen Abbey, Shiloh, Belleaire, Farragut Crossing, Village Green

Town staff is gearing up for 34th Annual Farragut Independence Day Parade, which kicks off at 9:30 a.m., Monday, July 4, from Farragut High School's junior parking lot.

Entrants, capped at 95 "with a waiting list," said Town Park and Rec director Sue Stuhl, will route down Lendon Welch Way/Stadium Drive, to Kingston Pike, then travel west to Boring Road, exiting into the "old" Ingles parking lot.

Parade entries include the Town of Farragut, with Parade Grand Marshals Cheri Intveld and Amy Burritt, owners of Euphoric Cheese Shop (photo on the right), the Town's Board of Mayor and Aldermen and the Farragut Museum's float, which will include current U.S.S. Farragut sailors, according to organizers.

Due to the Independence Day Parade, Kingston Pike from Lendon Welch Way to Federal Boulevard will be closed from 8:30 a.m. to about noon.

While no resident spoke at the meeting, most of the residents voted in favor of the traffic-calming devices, assistant Town engineer Brannon Tupper said.

In February 2021, Tupper said some Kings Gate residents applied for traffic-calming measures on Midhurst and Red Mill.

and Park Place.

Issues also were raised concerning the ability to hire employees, wages - and one resident saying, "you have a 1.48 out of 5 rating on the Better Business Bureau" website.

Pro Hy-Vee comments While officials answered a

few questions asked without either skepticism or support of the supermarket chain, one resident — saying she was a third generation Hy-Vee customer while living in Iowa and Minneapolis — spoke in favor of the proposed Farragut location on property owned by former Town Mayor Eddy Ford, which would be one of the first Hy-Vee supermarkets in the Southeastern United States.

"I grew up shopping at my grandparents' Hy-Vee in Iowa, and I'm kind of excited about this," the supporter added. "... I think there's a lot of positive things Hy-Vee would bring to our community. ..."

A husband-wife couple, who did not speak publically, also said they were in favor of Hy-Vee coming to Farragut based on being customers while living in Minneapolis.

Their opinion was expressed during an "open-house" portion of the event, where roughly four to six residents would speak with a Hy-Vee official at three "stations" set up with site plan maps of the Farragut site and enlarged store photos.

Basic information In reference to communication with Town of Farragut officials, Hy-Vee director of Site Planning John Brehm said "They asked us to come talk to the community first because the site, as we've learned over the last few months while we've been looking at it, has had some issues in the past."

While Hy-Vee is planning to use just more than the 20 acres fronting Kingston Pike for

its 156,000squarefoot store/ parking/ fuel station, etc., "We're looking at the entire property as whole," а Brehm

said, while

the back 40-plus acres would be leased.

"The middle (property is zoned for) kind of an office use, and the back will be a residential use; kind of a mixed-density use," Brehm said.

"... And we also understand that there's an overlay district on it to make it a town centertype of space," he added.

Concerning the proposed supermarket's one access point from Kingston Pike, it is planned to be across from Jamestowne Boulevard, Brehm said. "Jamestowne Boulevard would become a signalized access point" intersection.

"There's quite a bit of space between the residential areas and municipal areas to the north and our (proposed) store — there's a lot of greenspace," said Phil Hoey, Hy-Vee group vice president, Acquisitions/ Real Estate. "... What we try to do is match up densities with continuing neighborhoods."

However, "This has to be rezoned to do any of this," Brehm said. "That's why we're talking to you first, because this is a big change from what it was planned originally."

Products, procedures

Separating Hy-Vee from other town grocers, "We're employee-owned and we're community based," Brehm said, adding the company "has been able to get ahead of almost all of our supply issues; we have our own distribution centers."

As for getting fresh food, "We can work with local farmers and bring their products into our produce section," he said.

Currently, "we don't always know what each other are doing even though the campuses are right next door to us." Speas added, "so I think having one person seeing all of them in the feeder patterns will be a benefit to our students.

"At the end of the day, it provides more precise support to the school feeder pattern," said Dr. John Bartlett, Farragut High School principal.

"Instead of all the high schools overseen by a supervisor, the idea is for one supervisor to oversee schools K-12 in one area of town," Speas said. "Because the needs of different schools are unique in Knox County, this (plan) allows someone to dive deeper into the community, where there's more conversation between Hardin Valley Elementary, Hardin Valley Middle and Hardin Valley Academy, as well as Cedar Bluff Middle and Ball Camp Elementary and Cedar Bluff Elementary, so all the kids who end up coming to Hardin Valley Academy, one person is overseeing their education K-through-12.

"This allows for greater alignment and greater collaboration through feeder schools," he added.

Bartlett said the focus is on

"If anything, it would provide more support and collaboration and minimal impact on the schools," Bartlett added.

• Region One, in which all Farragut public schools are located, is led by director Danny Trent, who currently serves as executive director of secondary education — and is a former Farragut Middle School principal — and supervisor Shelly Maddux, who currently serves as Amherst Elementary School principal.

Also in Region One are Bearden High School, West Valley Middle School, A.L. Lotts Elementary, Blue Grass Elementary, Northshore Elementary, Bearden Elementary, Pond Gap Elementary, Rocky Hill Elementary, Sequoyah Elementary, West Hills Elementary, West View Elementary, Bearden Middle and Knoxville West High School.

• Region Two, in which all Hardin Valley public schools are located, is led by director Nathan Langlois, who currently serves as director of advancement and diversity, and supervisor Christy Dowell, who currently serves as supervisor of elementary education.


Also located within Region Two are Amherst Elementary, Ball Camp Elementary, Cedar Bluff Elementary, Karns Elementary, Norwood Elementary, Pleasant Ridge Elementary,

and Powell high schools.

"I believe that regional teams will help us foster community engagement and ownership in

the educational process and will shift the educational focus away from the Central Office back to individual schools,

where the most important work happens," Rysewyk said about the five new teams.

Resident's concerns postpone preliminary plat consideration

Farragut Municipal Planning Commission voted to postpone action for 30 days on a proposed preliminary plat for Westerly subdivision, which abuts Fox Den subdivision behind Dollar General Store, after hearing a resident's concerns during its meeting Thursday, June 16.

Batson, Himes, Norvell & Poe, the developers, are planning to build 12 residential lots on three parcels, consisting of 8.74 acres, zoned R-1 and R-2 to the north and west of Dollar General Store near the intersection of Kingston Pike and Old Stage Road. Community Development director Mark Shipley said the residential areas abut Fox Den subdivision.

Farragut resident Stacy Walters asked FMPC to reconsider an



Farragut is hoping for a dog park, and is looking to the community for help.

Town staff already has applied for a \$25,000 grant through The Boyd Foundation's Dog Park Dash, and the Town currently is in the required community engagement phase of the application process through Thursday, June 30.

According to Town social media posts, "dog owners are asked to follow Town of Farragut on Facebook, Instagram and Twitter, then upload pictures of their pets using the hashtag #DogPark-Dash2022, and mention #Farragut."

"The community engagement phase is where your community gets loud and proud over your application," Dog Park Dash's website stated.

Town officials incorporated the request Saturday, June 11, during Phase III Grand Opening festivities at McFee Park, where land already has been set aside for an eventual dog park.

About a dozen pets and their owners took part in a "doggie flash mob" recorded by drones, which has been added to the application requirement.

Additionally, members of the community also can visit www. dogparkdash.com/apply to nominate Farragut outright as part of the process, Town Parks manager Lauren Cox added.

The Boyd Foundation began offering Dog Park grants in 2018 and has announced this will be the last year of the program after reaching its 100-park funding goal.

This year's' award recipients will be announced July 20.

Walters added she and her husband also are guarded when pulling out of their driveway. "We're asking the entrance to be relocated further south," she said.

"The residential-zoned portion of this has fairly limited amount of frontage on Champions Point," Shipley said.

"The discussion back when the concept was reviewed was whether the applicant could work out a deal (with another property owner) to require part or all of the property to the south so the entrance could be shifted further to the south," he added, also noting the only place the entrance/ exit road can come out is di-

rectly across from an existing Fox Den residence.

"The applicant did indicate during a staff developer meeting May 31 they had talked with that property owner to the south and haven't been able to come to an agreement on the price that person's apparently wanting (for the property's purchase)," Shipley said. "So (the developers are) kind of limited on access points.

"They really can't shift it further north because the sight distance gets worse."

After a lengthy discussion, FMPC postponed action, asking to look at more measures to "increase safety metrics."

"I'm not opposed to the plan, but I'm concerned about safety," Commissioner Noah Myers said.

performing speed studies along those roads.

"We did several speed studies throughout the subdivision to see where the 85th percentile speed is — it's specifically 10 miles per hour over the posted speed limit," Tupper said. "That is the threshold of whether or not an application would be eligible for traffic calming."

The studies showed all locations were eligible, with some speeds upward of 43 miles per hour, he added. Based on those results, a public meeting was held, which resulted in mixed feelings about the speed cushions.

Some residents thought the traffic was a result of the cutthrough traffic from Virtue Road, but Tupper said a subsequent speed study showed people still were speeding.

Kings Gate residents then

voted on the speed cushions. Tupper said the policy re-

quires a 50 percent vote in favor from people in the affected area and 65 percent in the speed zone.

"We received 105 ballots back 70 percent of the affected area voted in favor of the measure and 83 percent of people in the speed zone voted for the speed cushions," he said. In other business, the

Board unanimously approved:

• a rezoning of .82 acres, owned by Fast Pace Urgent Care, 13013 Kingston Pike, from General Commercial District (C-1) to Rural Single-Family Residential (R-1).

Community Development director Mark Shipley said after completing its walk-in clinic on the 1.82-acre property, it realized it did not need all the property, which fronts Kingston Pike and Fleenor Road, so it is subdividing it to make way for a single-family home.

Nearly \$200k, 5-week upgrade has Cool Sports taking hiatus

Farragut's Cool Sports, Home of the Icearium, currently is on a five-week hiatus while owner Basil Skelton spends nearly \$200,000 on much-needed upgrades.

The 20-year-old regional ice rink, which boasts the only NHL-sized rink in the area, closed down Sunday, June 19, to begin the ice-melting process as staff prepares for installation of a new chiller and overhauling of the compressor and condenser.

'We are doing this for two reasons — because we care, and because we are letting the community know they are stuck with us," said Ronald

Cohorst, Cool Sports assistant chiller," Cohorst said. general manager, with the latter part said in jest. "We came out pretty strong on the other side of COVID-19 and are here to stay.

"Everything we are doing, will help us get ready for the next 20 years," he added.

The ice rink's sand subflooring — instead of concrete utilized at other sites, such as the Knoxville Civic Coliseum makes the process more lengthy, Cohorst said.

"We have to bring the temperature up gradually," he said. "If it was concrete, it would be a much quicker process.'

In addition to starting and completing the prep work, "we will have to remove the old Workers also will be check-

ing all pipes and parts while the new equipment is installed. Repainting inside also will be part of the overhaul.

"We are sticking with the baby blue and orange-stripe theme," confirmed Cohorst, who has been with Cool Sports for 17 years.

Upgrades also will take place on the separate indoor soccer and basketball courts, where its HVAC system will be overhauled.

Some aspects of the improvements will be up to the supply chain to provide. For example, its new compressor has been under construction in Canada since March.

Representing the biggest Division I (public school) classification, which became 4A this season, the Admirals' 4-1 state title game victory against Houston (Germantown) came Saturday afternoon, May 28, in Murfreesboro. A critical two-out, bases-loaded double from sophomore Eli Evans in the top of the seventh inning cleared the bases and broke a 1-1 tie. A Mustangs bases-loaded rally in the bottom of that inning was snuffed thanks to a game-ending double play. On top of limiting the opposing team's offense all season, the senior battery of ace pitcher Jaxson Pease and catcher Garrett Brewer also provided muchneeded team leadership while surrounded with so many young starters. District 4-4A League MVP Lukas Buckner, shortstop, joined Evans, a third-baseman/pitcher, among a slew of talented sophomores who contributed big at six starting positions. Matt Buckner's fifth state championship as Admirals skipper — in only his 12th full season at the helm — came with a final 30-11-1 season record.

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


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
KNOXVILLE CATHOLIC Division II-AA girls State Tennis CHAMPIONS






