
With Town Center finish 'targeted' October 2024, 'PCD' townhomes get unanimous BOMA approval

While Farragut Town Center at Biddle Farms has a "targeted overall completion date (of) roughly October 2024" according to Mark Shipley, Community Development director, the green light was given to build townhomes as part of the development.



The updated plan shows 47 two- and

three-story Federalstyle townhomes in the southeast corner of the development.

"Each lot would have 25 feet of (street) frontage," project developer Budd Cullom said. "We managed to figure that out."

"The floodplain would be to the east of the townhomes ... at Campbell Station Road, so it's kind of situated just to the east and

this project," Shipley said.

"Having the townhomes, you tend to get more people that could be in a convenient walking distance to

help support the town center itself and to kind of give it more energy in that area," he added.

The townhomes also would feature different kinds of brick to avoid monotony in the buildings.

Alderman Scott Meyer said he appreci-

Public forum to be held at Town election certification

Knox County Election Commission will certify results from the Farragut Election Thursday Aug. 18, which begins at 8 a.m. with a Public Forum — all voters are welcome to attend — before the election is certified.

The certification will be held in West Knox Election Commission office, 109 Lovell Heights Road.

If no problems are found, newly elected Town officials the re-election of Mayor Ron Williams and Ward I (North) Alderman Scott Meyer, and new Alderman-elect David White — will take the oathof-office to begin the Board of Mayor and Aldermen meeting around 7 p.m., Thursday, Aug. 25. **KCSOreports** This week's KCSO Reports includes a roughly \$120,000 scam

• At 10:05 a.m., Friday, Aug. 12, a Knox County Sheriff's Office responded to a Windward Drive address on report of fraud involving six figures in cash. Victim/complainant said she was scammed out of about \$120,000.

Victim said she received a notification from PayPal stating her account had been frozen due to fraudulent activity. Victim said she "called PayPal and spoke to someone who identified himself as the security officer of PayPal," the report stated.

"This unknown suspect told the victim that she needed to send him approximately \$90,000 via Bitcoin and Venmo for him to be able to reverse the fraudulent charges on her PayPal account. The suspect then connected the victim to an individual who identified himself as the security officer for First Horizon Bank.

The suspect told the victim that she needed to wire transfer \$69,999 to a bank in Cambodia before he could reverse the transactions on her bank account."

The victim initiated both transactions. *(Editor's Note):*

In a related matter to the above KCSO Report, Knox County Government is warning the public of a new phone scam.

A number of people received phone calls on (Aug. 10) from scammers who claim to work for the county's Benefit's Department and would like to meet in person with them or have someone come to their home to talk more about the matter," a report from Knox County Mayor Glenn Jacobs' Office stated.

"So far, the scammers have targeted the elderly and people who do not work for county government. The county's Benefit's Department would not ask someone to meet at their home," the report further stated.

"If residents receive such a call, the county requests that the person hang up and call either the Knoxville Police Department at 865-215-4010 or the Knox County Sheriff's Office at 865-215-2443."

• At 5 p.m., Sunday, Aug. 14, a complainant called KCSO Teleserve Unit to report a burglary to her vehicle, a 2020 Chevrolet Traverse, in the parking lot of McFee Park, 917 McFee Road.

She advised an unknown suspect shattered her passenger-side rear window and took her purse from inside the vehicle. She advised the doors to the vehicle had been locked. Total value of loss was listed at \$1,015, including \$600 for the damaged window. • At 4:08 p.m., Friday, Aug. 12, a complainant called the KCSO Teleserve Unit to report contractor fraud at a Mountain Breeze Lane address.

He advised in May 2022 he hired the suspect and her company to fix the ceiling in his home. He advised on May 16 the listed suspect had contacted him and stated the job would cost more than they had originally priced, and the complainant said he did not want to continue with the listed suspect doing the work.

He advised the listed suspect wouldn't return his \$800 deposit and therefore he sent the company a certified letter to return his money. He said he still has yet to hear back from the listed suspect on the matter and advised he spoke to a KCSO detective, who advised him to file the report for contractor fraud due to the complainant believing the listed suspect and business did not have license to be doing the work they agreed to do.

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

ated the Federal style of the buildings that complement the Campbell Station Inn's style.

The area also features open space.

Traffic concerns

Regarding Alderman Drew Burnette's question about traffic impact, Cullom said his engineers did an update to their traffic study that showed the impact was "nominal."

"The traffic engineer actually said the net peak hours were three extra trips," he added. "We felt like ... from a traf-

fic standpoint, it was much of less burа den than any commercial (business) would be.' While Burnette

still was



concerned about the impact on traffic, he conceded, "Reading the (traffic) data here makes me feel better ... but (traffic is) heavily on my mind.'

"I actually support it 100 percent because of the lesser impact on traffic," Meyer said about the added townhomes.

Next phase

With the first phase of the project completed — ALDI being open for business, completion of part of the parking lot and access available from Brooklawn Street to Kingston Pike — the next phase will include some of the multi-family dwellings and retail buildings along Main Street. Shipley said the third phase would incorporate the townhomes component, the remainder of the multi-family and remainder of the retail buildings.

Pinchok praised

"As everyone knows I've been an advocate for these (townhomes) from the beginning, so I appreciate adding these," Alderman Ron Pinchok said.

"Well, I am excited as Ron is," said Meyer, who thanked Pinchok for his part in bringing the townhomes to the project.

"It's another feather in your cap," Mever added. "It's part of the legacy that you're leav-

Town Center at Biddle Farms was rezoned to a PCD, a couple of areas were designated as future development. "When we first came through we were struggling with exactly what to put there," Cullom said. "My default mode was commercial, and Alderman Pinchok came to me with that idea ... it really took off, and we're really excited about this part of it."

FMPC amends plan

During the Farragut Municipal Planning Commission's meeting Thursday, July 21, FMPC voted 6-1 to recommend approving the amendment that updated the Cullom's Town Center master concept plan.

As Commissioner Michael Bellamy cast the lone vote against. Commissioners Scott Russ, Jon Greene, chairman Rita Holladay, Mayor Ron Williams, vice chairman Ed St. Clair and Vice Mayor Louise Povlin all voted in favor of the amendment. Noah Myers and Shannon Preston were absent.

In recommending approval, FMPC required the following: • Include a title sheet with the plan;

 Staff would note that this is a concept plan only and more detailed preliminary plat sheets would be needed when the townhome portion of the project is initiated.

· Cullom must contact staff for clarification updates.

Farragut Mayor Ron Williams said.

"It has been a six-year journey for us, for those of us who have worked behind the scenes to get Topgolf here," he added.

This has been a long journey, and this is certainly a big day for Farragut and Knox County," Grenier said.

"To say we are excited to have you here is an understatement," said Jane Jolley, a representative from Knox County Mayor Glenn Jacobs' office.

The open-air, 72-bay, twolevel building is the third Topgolf in Tennessee and the 79th worldwide. It is described architecturally by Topgolf officials as "the first of its kind in the state," featuring allweather outdoor hitting bays (hosting up to six players in each bay), a full-service restaurant, private event space, an elaborate bar/television viewing area "and year-round family-friendly programming for all ages."

Unique to Topgolf, according to one of its press releases, is "signature Toptracer technology," described as "the most trusted ball-tracing technology in the golf industry, powering the experience at the venue and enabling players to enjoy favorite games like Angry Birds and Jewel Jam."

Players may use their own clubs or rent from Topgolf.

Oak Ridge resident Darren Osborne said he had visited Topgolf locations in Las Vegas and Atlanta before checking out the Farragut site. "What I like about it is that it offers golf for everyone," he said.

"It's just a good time, a good place to hang out and a great atmosphere," Osborne added.

Hours are from 10 a.m. to midnight, Sunday through Thursday, and from 10 a.m. to 1 a.m., Fridays and Saturdays.

Cost varies, depending on the day and time, but guests pay per hour. During the week, it is \$27 an hour from opening to noon; \$37 an hour from noon to 5 p.m.; and \$47 an hour from 5 p.m. to close. Cost is half price on Tuesdays and increases \$3 per hour on Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays.

All Topgolf players are required to purchase a \$5 lifetime membership.

in recent years, which have drawn "over 6,000 people" according to Alliance executive director Stephen Krempasky, "We have not done a fundraiser since pre-COVID, so we're looking at trying to get some revenue — and how to do that," he added. "What's different and what makes sense for us to be involved in" should be the focus.

As for specifics, "The idea is to do some sort of food or beverage highlight. But how that's done, we don't know yet," Krempasky said. "Candace (Viox, Alliance chair) mentioned something where we develop a fall festival that would feature, maybe, brewery or distillery samples, and people would get a wrist band that allows them, for one flat fee ... to sample everything they like. "And you would have food trucks and other entities that want to showcase, where they can sell or do a \$5 admission and we do a kickback to them," he added. Additionally, he said other businesses could showcase their products and services with a small booth fee.

(businesses) can donate to us, and do the idea of a sampling," Krempasky said.

"In the past, with the Taste of Farragut, one of the reasons we couldn't do it as a restaurant was we were asked to donate all of our food and our labor and to man the booth to give away all of the product," Viox said. "We're trying to figure out a way ... utilize some our local breweries, local alcohol and turn it more into a brewery-alcohol tasting event."

As for hatching the fall fest idea, "We had a small meeting, Candace and I since our last board meeting, trying to identify something to do in the fall, before Countdown to Light the Park ...," Krempasky said.

Alliance members also discussed several possible vento do that is during fall break," the executive director said.

He explained the event must happen there when it does not interfere with parents picking up their children after school at Farragut Intermediate and Farragut Middle schools.

Day of the week

"I thought maybe the Sunday before school starts back," Krempasky suggested. "Certainly, the parking lot over at Village Green would be available and Stein Mart is a possibility until it gets leased.

"But I'm open for all ideas until we pull the trigger," he added.

Krempasky suggested holding the event on a Sunday because of University of Tennessee Football being so popular on Saturdays. "And Sundays are actually very good for turnout," he added.

'Focus on kids'

FWKCC Breakfast Series spotlights ET Children's Hospital

The unique qualities of East Tennessee Children's Hospital were shared with Farragut West Knox Chamber of Commerce members, government officials and other Knox County business representatives.

The occassion was a FWKCC Breakfast Speaker Series event in Rothchild Catering & Conference Center, 8807 Kingston Pike, Tuesday, Aug. 2.

"We're the only hospital that focuses on kids," said featured speaker Matt C. Schaefer, ETCH president/CEO.

"As of 2021, the United States was home to over 6,000 hospitals," said Julie Blaylock, FWKCC CEO/president, while introducing Schaefer.

However, ETCH was among "only 2 percent of those facilities operating as larger acutecare children's hospitals that were providing specialized programs," she added.

"That obligates that very small number of hospitals to provide targeted care for nearly 80 million of the country's children, which is over 20 percent of our entire population."

"In a lot of ways, we're a mission that hopes to never exist," Schaefer said. "We

would love for no one to ever need our services. We'd love for healthy kids to be healthy and never require a children's hospital, but we know that's not the world we live in.

"We've served 160,000 patients just from Knox County," he added. "One hundred and sixty times, someone walked through and saw a pediatrician ... a specialist ... the ER.

"It doesn't matter whether it's 2 o'clock in the afternoon on a Tuesday or 2 a.m. on New Year's Eve, mom and dad are

"We had suspected Alzheim-

er's, but the day they confirmed it in 2015, our first stop was at the Alzheimer's Tennessee office," Underwood recalled. "They were helpful to both of us, from the very beginning, and that began my volunteering with the organization."

Although Al passed away four-and-a-half years ago, she remains devoted to Alzheimer's Tennessee, not only as a board member but also as a sponsor and team captain for the annual Knoxville Walk to Make Alzheimer's a Memory.

going to be so concerned about their most prized possession that they're going to go to a place that they trust for care, and we've had 85 years of being trusted."

The facility started as Knox County Crippled Children's Hospital in 1937 during the polio epidemic.

"I stand on the shoulders of giants in terms of what's been

built here," Schaefer said. "We've had to re-invent ourselves a number of times to be a full-service children's hospital," he added.

"That means if your child needs access to pediatric specialized care, there's almost every pediatric specialist you can imagine, ranging from primary care pediatrics all the way to pediatric neurosurgery here at Children's Hospital."

Schaefer said the hospital grew a lot in the 1970s and 1980s, when it started to have more and more pediatric specialists, and expanded outside the hospital — adding 25 locations of care across the region.

"I'm a big advocate of Children's Hospital," attendee Stephanie Mader said. "Its an organization of people who really care."

M. Shannon Littleton, general manager of Lenoir City Utilities Board, related how ETCH helped his family during a crisis.

Shaefer said he joined ETCH because he wanted to do something different with his life and to change lives.

From rival HVA, Burris, 31, ready to lead Ads boys hoops

Going only 6 miles to find their new varsity boys basketball head coach, Farragut High School brass chose a young man with no head coaching experience.

However, FHS principal Dr. John Bartlett and athletic director Donald Dodgen spoke glowingly of J.P. Burris, 31 — having lured away their new Admirals skipper from rival Hardin Valley Academy.

"When we found out coach (Jon) Higgins was resigning, I started reaching out to people I knew in the basketball community," Bartlett said to the basketball players, who gathered in the school's library to hear and meet their new coach Thursday afternoon, Aug. 11. "I got names from different people. Coach (Dodgen) did the same, different people.

"And one of the consistent names from everybody sending names was J.P. Burris," he added. "One thing they said was, 'He fits your culture, he fits Farragut, he fits what you believe. ...'

"He stands for what I believe in, OK, so he's a coach from my heart. He knows basketball and he knows it well. And he knows young men."

Under Burris, "He'll demand you be the hardest-working basketball team on the court, no matter who we play," Bartlett said. "When the ball's loose, we'll be down first to get it."

"He's going to fit it very well at the school, both as a teacher (physical education) and a coach," Dodgen said after the meeting. "... Our program's going in the right direction, and he's going to keep it in the right direction.'

Burris addresses his new team "First and foremost, I want you to know

that I'm very excited to be here," Burris told the players. "Farragut High School and Farragut basketball is a destination, it's not a stop. I understand how fortunate I am to be here with you guys."


