Encouraging news

"The year 2023 marks the 52nd anniversary of the National Cancer Act of 1971, which designated

defeating cancer as a national priority. The Act allocated substantial resources to the National Cancer Institute, which has seen a 25-fold annual budget increase since the law was enacted, from \$227 million to more than \$6 billion.

"... The new analysis, appearing in ... JAMA Oncology, found that as of 2019 mortality rates for all cancers combined dropped by 27 percent since 1971 and by 32 percent since 1991, when mortality rates

were highest. Mortality rates have dropped since 1971 for 12 of 15 investigated cancer sites, including by as much as 70 percent for cervical and stomach cancer."

Court Appointed Special Advocates of East Tennessee, 5410 Homberg Drive Suite 29A in Knoxville, are trained to represent the best interests of children in juvenile abuse and neglect court cases.

"CASA of East Tennessee is a community based program that recruits, trains and supports citizenvolunteers to advocate for the best interests of abused and neglected children in Knox County."

CASA volunteers work to discover a child's best interest, collaborating closely with Knox County Juvenile Court, educators, medical professionals, community organizations, social workers and relevant government agencies to find the child a safe, permanent home as quickly as possible.

It's mission is "to improve the lives of abused and neglected children through trained volunteers who advocate for safe, permanent, loving homes."

Empowerment

"We empower children to express their concerns and fears, as well as share their hopes and dreams, and for them to all be heard by their families and the court."

Bridge Refugee Services, Inc.

The Mission of Bridge Refugee Services, Inc. "is to provide opportunities for refugees and international protected classes to rebuild their lives, after suffering persecutions, so that they become productive, contributing members of the community. Bridge cultivates public/private partnerships to uphold the three pillars of refugee integration: learning English, employment and community engagement," BRS press release stated

"Bridge Clients in East Tennessee have arrived from countries including Afghanistan, Ukraine, Cuba, Haiti, Democratic Republic of Congo, Vietnam, Myanmar, Ethiopia, Burundi, Iraq, Venezuela, Colombia, Sudan and many others," the release further stated.

"Bridge has been resettling refugees in East Tennessee for over 40 years," said Noah McBrayer Jones, BRS Development and Communication director.

Bridge Refugee Services is the only refugee and international protected class resettlement agency in East Tennessee, with locations in Knoxville and Chattanooga.

In celebration of local diversity and the contributions refugees make to the community, BRS Knoxville celebrated its Adding the Spice Gala Thursday evening, Sept. 14, at the Episcopal School of Knoxville, celebrating with "an evening of international influence and celebration supported branches in Chattanooga and Knoxville," a BRS press release stated.

Bridge Refugee Services also is instrumental in "international rec-



ognition surrounding Welcoming Week," held Sept. 8-17 earlier this fall, which annually "brings together neighbors of all backgrounds to build strong connections and affirm the importance of welcoming and inclusive places in achieving collective prosperity," the BRS press release stated.

"Welcoming Week is an opportunity for all members of the community to come together and to celebrate the incredible addition these new residents make to the area's group dynamic," Jones said.

"Worldwide there are more than 20 million refugees which natural disasters, persecution or war have forcibly displaced," the release stated. "More than half of these are children. Despite these numbers, less than 1 percent of these refugees permanently resettle permanently in new countries of residence.

"Since the program's institution in 1980, the United States has accepted 2 million refugees. At present, the US anticipates accepting 125,000 refugees (by the end of) in 2023."

Childhelp

Mission statement (quotes from Eddie Smith, director of Organizational Advancement)

Since 1995, the fully accredited Childhelp Children's Center of East Tennessee has served victims of child abuse and neglect through advocacy, treatment and investigation services.

"Our Foster Family Agency serves 17 counties in East Tennessee. Last year we expanded, fairly largely, our Mental Health Services," where these services for abused and neglected children have expanded from helping 30 per week to helping 125 per week.

During one stretch in 2022, 11 children were adopted in a two-month span.

A service launched in January 2022, which looks to help almost 10,000 children in Knox County an-

nually, is "Speak Up and Be Safe." It teaches abused and neglected children from pre-kindergarten through 12th-grade how to communicate the hardships they suffer to better identify their home environment problems. "It's the only program like it in the country."

That 17-county service area also has a new program, as of January 2023, to financially assist grandparents and other relatives who are legal guardians of children abused or neglected by their parents.

In addition to year-round needs of these children, "We want to make sure we're taking care of those kids' wish list for Christmas."







"Medic was established in 1958 by Carl Nelson M.D. under the sponsorship of the Knoxville Academy of Medicine.

"Area physicians supported the not-for-profit blood center because they wanted a source of blood from volunteer donors, and they desired centralization of blood collection, testing and distribution."

Uniqueness, range

"... MEDIC is the only U.S. blood center that has a Blood Coverage Program covering members' blood supplier processing fees at any hospital in the country.

"... Today, MEDIC Regional

Blood Center is the sole provider of products" for 25 hospitals in Knox and 21 other surrounding counties.

Based in West Knoxville since its inception in 1996, Mission of Hope helps grade school-age children in "the most distressed and poorest areas of rural Appalachia that are classified as such by the Appalachian Regional Commission."

Specifically targeted for assistance which in recent years has included scholarship dollars for hard-working high school students with excellent grades "who otherwise wouldn't get a scholarship" — are children and their families in 29 schools in Northeast Tennessee, Southeast Kentucky and Southwest Virginia.

Currently serving more than 13,000 "children, siblings and family members ... God has blessed us with resources and volunteers and opportunities more than anyone ever imagined."

In addition are "Mountain Minis-

try Centers," which add Mission of Hope resources to assist "individuals or couples in these rural areas that have been heartbroken to help the poor. ... But they don't have a lot of help locally."

As for the Scholarship Program, "It's really impacted some lives. I think there's now 79 graduates from 2- or 4-year (colleges)" who received a scholarship, helping make their college experience possible.
