About 100 volunteers, from veterans to families and Scouts, arrived at Pleasant Forest Cemetery to lay wreaths on the graves of veterans as part of this year's national Wreaths Across America program Saturday morning, Dec. 14.

"We're here to remember not their deaths, but their lives," said Farragut operations manager Chris Sheffield, a retired Air Force officer. "Each wreath is a gift of our appreciation from a grateful America."

Participants were asked to step up to the grave, place the wreath, say aloud the name of the veteran and thank him for his service.

Dave Stinton, Pleasant Forest Cemetery caretaker, along with cemetery board members provided cards, each with information about a veteran and where his grave is located in the cemetery, to those laying wreaths.

Town Mayor Ron Williams said there were 278 wreaths being placed on veterans' graves in Farragut. Along with Pleasant Forest, wreaths also were laid on veterans' graves at Virtue Cumberland Presbyterian Church Cemetery along Evans Road and Grigsby Chapel Cemetery.

Among those laying wreaths were Williams, District 5 Knox County Commissioner Angela Russell, District 5 Knox County Board of Education rep Lauren Morgan and Brad Hair, representing Knox County Mayor Glenn Jacobs' Office.

After University of Tennessee's Army Reserve Officer Training Corps members presented the Colors, U.S. Navy veteran Pastor Patrick Pence presented the invocation.

Redlight system '5 months behind'

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With Town traffic congestion something most Farragut citizens must tackle, it was a local businesswoman and chair of Shop Farragut/Farragut Business Alliance asking a key question concerning technology originally scheduled to be completed earlier this fall, which would better time traffic light changes and help alleviate congestion.

"What's going on with the lights, the traffic and the craziness?" Candace Viox, owner of Water into Wine bistro and lounge, asked Town administrator David Smoak during the SF/FBA meeting in Farragut Community Center Wednesday

morning, Dec. 11.

"I see it at (North) Campbell Station (Road) on Grigsby Chapel (Road), especially at school time. And then everybody's making a left (from Grigsby to North Campbell) trying to get on the freeway, and it backs all the way up. And I get to hear about it all the time," she

'So the contractor is five months behind schedule," Smoak answered. "We are still waiting on them to finish their main work to get done. When they finish, then we will have a timing plan, all these other new things that are going to come with that we'll be able to put in place. And then we'll actually have access to it from a staff point to where we can make adjustments as we need to.

"So all that's still not in place," he added. "... And the little sensors that we have, they try to find the cars as they're pulling up, things like that. Some of those are working, some of them aren't. Those are all things that, if they go out, can back up traffic very quickly and make things a mess. And they're still working through that.

"It's basically a 60-day window for us to continue monitoring. But we really are trying to make sure everything is working right, and we're still not there yet.'

Specifically, "I think all the stuff is in the ground; it's now equipment," Smoak said.

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Father Reed at SJNCC subject of 'boundary violation' complaints; on administrative leave: letter

Concerning what The Diocese of Knoxville labeled as "an important matter concerning Father Joseph Reed," priest at St. John Neumann Catholic Church and School, the following is a letter addressed to "Dear Beloved Parish Members" and shared with farragutpress from John Mecklenborg, director of The Diocese of Knoxville Office of Communications, concerning Reed:

"On behalf of the Diocese of Knoxville and Bishop Mark Beckman, we are writing to inform you of an important matter concerning Father Joseph Reed.

"Effective immediately, (Reed) will be placed on administrative leave in accordance with the Diocese of Knoxville Safe Environment Policy. A complaint of boundary violations has been brought to the Diocese's attention, and we are committed to being fully transparent about our response.

'As required by Diocesan policy, the complaint has been reported to state authorities. The diocese has informed Father Reed of the complaint and will await the completion of the civil authorities' investigation before conducting its own independent and comprehensive review of the matter.

'With an abundance of caution, Father Reed has been removed from his pastoral responsibilities during the time of the investigation, as our primary concern is the protection of those in our care and ensuring a fair, comprehensive review of the al-

"During this investigative process, we uphold the principle of presumption of innocence and will take appropriate measures to protect the individual's dignity and reputation until the facts are

"That's really what they're working on, is equipment and fine-tuning the equipment.

"... We have video monitoring now that we can do on the intersections, and we get a lot of people to say, 'you all are only letting two or three cars through," he added.

'It's a 12-second light. So if people pay attention instead of being distracted, you can get five or six or seven cars, even, through a 12-second light. And so when people are distracted,

that causes you to get two or three, maybe four cars."

Reaching out for more help, "We've hired another contractor engineering firm to come in and give us another set of timing plans," Smoak said. "So we're going to work off the first one we have, and then we're going to work off another one, and we're going to see which one works best.

"So this is going to be, I would say, two or three months of just changing timing patterns as we get into it to see what's the most efficient plan for us," he added.

by the places every day — but you haven't stopped," Krempasky added.

With last year's success of the Crunchy Mama Box pavilion, "we're going to put that in the assembly room this year" as Crunchy Mama Box Wellness Pavilion, Krempasky said, adding it will offer more vendors with healthy products to demonstrate and sell.



LENOIR CITY — Failing to score a point for the game's first 5 minutes, 40 seconds, and unable to connect on a field goal for the first 6 minutes, 20 seconds, Farragut's boys basketball team had a high climb against Lenoir City at LCHS Friday night, Dec. 13.

Finally catching — and passing — the Panthers when senior standout wing/post Dom VanAcker nailed a three-point jumper with 5:03 left in regulation, Farragut had its first lead of the game at 44-43.

From there, the Admirals went on a 10-0 run to lead 54-43 on VanAcker's rebound basket at the 2:50 mark

of the final period, which pretty much salted away this comeback victory, 58-47.

Farragut trailed 13-0 in the first quarter against the Panthers, who fell to 1-4 entering this week.

'A very horrible start," said VanAcker, who scored a game-high 17 points in the victory as Farragut improved its overall record to 7-3 entering this week.

"We really came out soft, we really had no energy," he added. "But that three (to finally go ahead) really started it."

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"At halftime (trailing 33-28) we were down on ourselves and our coach (J.P. Burris) was on us because we weren't playing well," said Parker Lane, FHS standout junior point guard who scored 14 points.

"But we're a team — this year more than last (year) and we're a family, and when bad things happen we come together," he added.

Farragut was led in scoring by Elin Rotan's seven points. followed by Audrey Vann's six and Jayna Carbaugh's five.





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
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

Mark down April 15 for Knox pro baseball return, as CEO of Smokies at RCF meeting

Tennessee Smokies Baseball fans can get ready — construction on the new field, Covenant Health Park in downtown Knoxville, is expect to be completed for the 2025 home opening game on April 15, according to Doug Kirchhofer, CEO of Tennessee

He presented the club's plans to The Rotary Club of Farragut members during their meeting in Fox Den Country Club Wednesday, Nov. 13.

Kirchhofer said the formal groundbreaking for the new stadium was June 13, 2023; but demolition of buildings on and along the property started in 2021.

'There was mass grading in preparation for construction starting in summer of 2022," he added. "Formal construction began in March 2023. It's about a 24-month construction period."

Construction is ongoing for the \$114 million park, which in ad-

dition to hosting the Smokies will be the home of OneKnox soccer program, concerts and festivals, and will be able to seat up to 9,925 fans. The April 15 Smokies home opener "will be the first event on the field," Kirchhofer said. Surrounding the park are private development projects, such

as a restaurant, retail, public plazas and a nine-story structure housing the Smokies head office and condos, which currently are available, and a five-story apartment building. There also will be community space, with views of the park, for apartment residents.

However, "we may have some smaller soft-opening type of events with spaces around the stadium," Kirchhofer added.

Individual ticket prices, excluding club areas, for Smokies games range from \$10 to \$18.

"One of the interesting elements of the stadium is a club area on the second level overlooking the field," the CEO said.

Bill Meyer Stadium club area, former home of the Smokies in East Knoxville through 1999, "probably was 1,200 square feet

with a capacity of 50 or 60 people, but this (new) one has a club area that's about 5,300 square feet with a capacity of 350," he added, noting the club area provides the capability to bring downtown events to the stadium.

"It would be a very unique environment and atmosphere for those type of events. We think there are a lot of opportunity for business meetings, parties, receptions and those types of things ... on nongame days."

Looking back, ahead

Kirchhofer has been with Smokies for 24 years, according to RCF president-elect Candace Viox, during which the Smokies have been located in Kodak (Sevier County), taking Exit 407 off I-40.

"He has played a key role in the growth and direction of the Smokies organization," she said.

"I have enjoyed my involvement with the Smokies over the past 24 years," said Kirchhofer, who started with the club in 2001, a couple years after the team moved from Knoxville to Kodak — 2 miles east of the Knox County line.

"Many of you have probably

been to the existing Smokies Stadium," he added. "Many of you probably also remember 25, 27 years ago, when conversations were ongoing about whether there would be a new ballpark someplace adjacent or around Knoxville or Knox County to replace Bill Meyer Stadium."

Bill Meyer Stadium originally opened in 1953 as Knoxville Municipal Stadium and later was renamed after the late Knoxville catcher and manager in Major League Baseball and long-time Minor League skipper. It was demolished in 2003 and the property is being eyed for new development.

"Timing is everything, and the timing wasn't right (27 years ago) for lots of reasons,"

Kirchhofer said about keeping the Smokies in Knoxville. "I think the reaction probably ranged from 'it's a disaster' to 'who cares?' and everywhere in between.

"But, 25 years later, the timing is right," he added.

Last-minute holiday shopping tips
