## 'Avoid Boyd' starting in June; 8 to 10 weeks

Motorists usually traveling along Boyd Station Road in Farragut might need to find another route for about eight to 10 weeks starting in June.

As part of The Grove at Boyd Station subdivision development along Boyd Station Road, Rackley Engineering expects to be making improvements to that road, which include a roundabout.

"As soon as we get bids, and then we'll have to come back to the Board (of Mayor and Aldermen to make sure everybody's on board — June, I'd like to start," Russ Rackley, owner of Rackley Engineering, said at the Farragut Municipal Planning Commission Staff/ Developer meeting Tuesday, April 29, regarding the timetable for the road project.

Rackley said both lanes of Boyd Station would be closed during construction.

"I think, for cost and time advantages and being that the only intersection there is our development, which isn't connected yet, we'll hard close both ends of it and detour around Evans (Road)," he added. "I'll have a traffic control plan and we'll have to put warning signs on McFee Road and Virtue that says 'Boyd Station closed."

"Do you have any idea how long that will take?" Community Development director Mark Shipley asked. Rackley estimated eight to 10 weeks but added, "I think it will go pretty quick."

He said the roundabout is going to be "where the design connection for our subdivision is proposed.

"It's approximately 3,500 feet" of road improvements," starting at the McFee Road intersection with

### TPO study advises Town, Hardin Valley road revamps thru '50

(First of two parts: four local plans through 2035)

With Farragut and Hardin Valley road improvements prominent in its long-range planning for the next quarter century, Mobility Plan 2050 was adopted by Knoxville Regional TPO Executive Board at its meeting Wednesday, April 30.

"This long-range transportation plan will guide infrastructure investments over the next 25 years and allows federal money to be received for them," a TPO press release stated. "It is updated every four years to account for changes in community and regional priorities, technology, project costs and available funding.

"This plan ensures the best decisions are being made for our communities so that we can all get from Point A to Point B safely and efficiently," said Doug Burton, TPO coordinator. "Now that the plan has been adopted, these projects can begin to move through the development process.

"The projects were selected and prioritized after consideration of both technical analysis and public input, with a focus on safety, modernization, congestion management and

#### Defending speed bumps, Town brass

I am writing in response to a recent Letter to the Editor concerning the speed bumps on Sonja Drive and Admiral Road. While I appreciate the author's concern for public safety, I must respectfully disagree with the statements made, particularly those suggesting that the speed bumps on our roads are illegal or were improperly installed.

The Town of Farragut, along with the residents of our neighborhood, followed the appropriate and lawful procedures to approve the installation of these speed bumps. The process involved a formal vote, several opportunities for public input and adherence to municipal regulations and guidelines. This ensured that the traffic-calming measures were implemented through a community-driven and legally sound process.

Regarding the Americans with Disabilities Act, it is important to clarify that Section 35.151 addresses the new construction and alteration of facilities by public entities. The ADA does not prohibit the use of speed bumps on public streets, provided they do not obstruct accessibility for individuals with disabilities and that pedestrian areas, such as sidewalks and parking lots, remain fully usable.

On Sonja Drive, the existing speed bumps are thoughtfully placed and do not interfere with sidewalk access or pedestrian mobility on the sidewalks in any way. In contrast, Admiral Road lacks a sidewalk altogether, which poses far more significant accessibility and safety concerns. Residents on Admiral Road are forced to walk along the roadway often in close proximity to speeding vehicles.

What must not be overlooked is the ongoing and serious issue of speeding along Admiral Road and Sonja Drive. As a resident of Admiral Road, I have repeatedly witnessed drivers accelerating aggressively over the speed bumps, clearly attempting to undermine their intended purpose. In addition to excessive speeding, I have observed disturbing behaviors, such as loud honking and engine revving, when driving over the speed bumps, along with a blatant disregard for the clearly posted 25-mile-per-hour speed limit. Speeding through residential neighborhoods, unnecessary aggressive and antagonistic driving behavior and ignoring traffic-calming measures puts children, pedestrians, cyclists, pets and fellow drivers at risk.

The purpose of these speed bumps is to reduce risk and not

Boyd Station Road and ending at the "extent of our development property ... plus from the western edge of our subdivision to the McFee Road intersection," Rackley said.

"The Town is participating (in the improvements)," Shipley said. "Of course, the Board has already approved the financing for it. Basically, it's a 3-foot widening of the Boyd Station Road.

"They are going to mill an inch-and-a-half overlay, 3 ½-inch binder and 1 ½-inch surface to Boyd Station Road itself," he added. "One of the

things the Board had asked the developer and the Town is to look" to add a roundabout.

"Boyd Station Road is a

pretty long straightaway, "t just kind of invites faster car speeds." So to slow down motorists on

that section of the road, Shipley said the Board supported including the roundabout. Shipley added a proposed

walking trail along Boyd Station Road would eventually tie into the Virtue trail with a 6-foot grass strip between the edge of the road and edge of

"The Town will have to put in the last section across the property between The Grove at

Boyd Station and McFee Road, which is the Gibson property,' he said. "The roundabout itself is kind of asymmetrical.

"It's all to the north," Shipley added about the roundabout. "You know you have the railroad right-of-way to the south.

This roundabout, "unlike the two that are on McFee Road, should actually slow you down," he said. "This is like the Virtue Road (roundabout), where you veer off and come back into the main road section.

"I think roundabouts have kind of evolved — in the Town at least," he added.

"Is the roundabout a raised

roundabout?" Planning Commissioner Ron Pinchok asked. "Is it raised off the road surface? Is there a curb?"

"Yes," Rackley answered. "I'm not proposing any wall or anything like Virtue Road, but dimensionally, this is the same as the Virtue roundabout."

"I like that; it's good," Pinchok said.

"It will meet (standards for) buses, fire trucks, everything" except 53-foot 18-wheelers, Rackley said.

"They will be over a curb or in the center landscaping if they try to navigate through it ... there shouldn't be an 18-wheeler down through there," he added.



## Anchor 934 Apartments cuts ribbon

The long-awaited moment for Anchor 934 Apartments came to fruition recently when Biddle Development Residential president Joe Fielden Jr. — whose father's company, JA Fielden Co., Inc., was project contractor — cut the ribbon on community at 200 Brooklawn St. in Farragut.

"We've been watching and waiting for this to be built for quite a while," said Julie Blaylock, president/CEO of Farragut West Knox Chamber of Commerce, which sponsored the ribbon cutting.


