The fight for Farragut

Candidates discuss schools, business, taxes

Four candidates seeking seats on the Farragut Board of Mayor and Aldermen answered questions during a candidate forum hosted by Tennessee Strategies at the Farragut Community Center on Monday evening, July 13.

Among the questions was one asking mayoral candidate Louise Povlin about her background and why she is qualified to serve as mayor.

Povlin said she has lived in Farragut for 18 years, where she raised her children, volunteered in Knox County Schools and opened a small business in town in 2012.

An engineer, she said the late Mayor Ralph McGill asked her to serve on the Farragut Municipal Planning Commission. She later was appointed to fill a vacancy on the Board of Mayor and Aldermen in 2015, elected to the seat in 2016 and re-elected in 2020 before reaching

term limits in 2024.

"I can run for one term as mayor, and I'm absolutely fine with that," Povlin said. "If you want a mayor who is educated and knowledgeable and will stand with you in a neighborhood meeting and answer your questions, and if she doesn't have the answers, know who she needs to go to, that's who I am."

Asked whether the Town should contribute more to public education, Povlin said Farragut already supports its schools.

She said the Public Works Department provides assistance in various ways. She also said she convinced Town administrator David Smoak to have participants in the Intro to Farragut class complete volunteer projects at local schools.

Povlin added she served as an ex-officio member of the Farragut High School Education Foundation board, the Board provides a community grant to schools and the Town has an Education Relations Committee.

"I reworked (the committee) a couple years ago into making it more effective by bringing in representatives from the schools," she said.

On attracting businesses, Povlin said residents consistently tell her they want more locally owned businesses.

"And we have a lot, and we want more," she said. "But they need special support in their build-out. ... We need to make sure we are helping them with that."

She said traffic and communication are the town's two biggest issues.

"I think those are the things that need to get squared away," Povlin said.

The forum also featured candidates for aldermen, including incumbent Joe LaCroix, who is running for South Ward Seat 2, and North Ward Seat 1 candidates Dian Hall and Joey Ruffalo.

"I'm running for this position because I think my thoughts and

Forum no-shows cite concerns

While four candidates seeking Farragut Board of Aldermen seats attended a candidate forum hosted by Tennessee Strategies at the Farragut Community Center on Monday evening, July 13, two candidates were absent.

Alex Cain, who is running for mayor, and Greg Wiberley, who is seeking the South Ward Seat 2 position, chose not to attend. On Tuesday morning, both shared their reasons.

"The way this event unfolded in planning, communication and execution has raised serious concerns about whether it was being transparent in its own motivations," Cain stated in an email.

"First, the forum promoted itself as open, fair and balanced. Yet all emails from the forum organizers failed to identify any individuals or planners."

On July 10, event organizer Mike Arms, Tennessee Strategies senior partner, left a voicemail for

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Farragut mayoral candidates share views in Q&A

As Farragut voters prepare for early voting, which starts Friday, July 17, the Town's mayoral candidates supplied answers to questions from farragutpress. Former Vice Mayor Louise Povlin and current Alderman Alex Cain continue to address concerns about traffic, public safety and development. Voters will be able to cast their early votes in Farragut Community Center through Saturday, Aug. 1. The Election Day will be Thursday, Aug. 6.

1. Public safety is a top priority for many Farragut residents: With a new Knox County sheriff taking office and discussions about increasing patrols within the town, what role should the mayor play in working with the sheriff's office to enhance public safety and what additional measures, if any, would you support?

2. Managing Growth: Farragut continues to attract new residential and commercial development. How would you balance continued growth with preserving the town's character, and what specific changes, if any, would you support in the Town's planning or zoning policies?

3. Public Trust: Some residents have expressed concerns about transparency and citizen engagement, particularly following changes to the Board of Mayor and Aldermen's public comment policy. As mayor, what steps would you take to improve public trust, encourage citizen participation and ensure residents feel their voices are heard?

4. Biggest concern for Farragut: Every community faces difficult decisions about its future. What do you see as the single biggest issue Farragut will face over the next four to eight years, and why?

5. Property Rights: Transportation and multimodal improvements are long-term priorities for the Town of Farragut, but some residents and property owners have expressed concerns about how these projects could affect their land —specifically Turkey Creek Road and Evans Road. What principles would guide your decisions when balancing community infrastructure needs with individual property rights?

1. Public safety is a top priority for many Farragut residents: Upon being sworn in as mayor, I will direct the Town administrator and attorney to review community agreements with county sheriff's offices statewide. This review will enable productive conversations with the Knox County Sheriff's Office to develop a mutually beneficial long-term partnership. I have known Sheriff-elect Gibson for some time, and we have already discussed increased traffic enforcement and greater patrol visibility as soon as he takes office.

2. Managing Growth: As mayor, I will promote responsible growth that protects property

rights while ensuring extensive public input from the outset. Residents deserve a real voice in shaping development decisions early in the process.

I support targeted

1. Public safety is a top priority for many Farragut residents: It is vital that the mayor and the sheriff have a collaborative and supportive relationship. The Town needs a designated agency contact, so issues can be dealt with quickly and seamlessly. Sheriff-Elect Gibson should be given respect and time to implement his vision. The Town should be prepared to seek solutions for dedicated personnel if we need it.

2. Managing Growth: Farragut residents have reshaped our land use map and aligned it with the existing zoning. Farragut residents need to participate in reshaping our land use goals moving forward. Plans

to begin that process are in the works.

3. Public Trust: Much of what the Planning Commission and the Board do and the rules we must follow are a mystery to most residents.

KEY TIMELINE OF EVENTS

July 18, 2024 —

Farragut Planning Commission Meeting

- The Farragut Planning Commission considered adopting the Mixed-Use Town Center Vision Plan as a town ordinance.
- Vice Mayor Louise Povlin strongly supported the move.
- The Vision Plan’s map identified an Event Center and boutique hotel on Eddy Ford’s land along Kingston Pike.

Town legal counsel advised adopting the plan as a resolution, not an ordinance — a setback to the desired Event Center.

January 2026 —

Budget Retreat Discussion

- Alderman Drew Burnette stated on the record that he wanted the Town to purchase Eddy Ford’s land and build an Event Center.
- Alderman Joe LaCroix followed by suggesting the Town issue bonds to buy the land and construct the facility.Audio recording available here:

FINANCIAL CONSIDERATIONS

Land Cost:

- Last known purchase price for the Ford property: \$16 million.
- Adding a Town-owned Event Center would significantly increase total costs.
- Residents have asked whether this level of debt could eventually require a property tax.

Planning & Consulting Costs

- The Town paid \$1.2 million to TSW, Consultants of Atlanta for the Mixed-Use Town Center Vision Plan.
- The Town recently approved the same firm to replace the Comprehensive Land Use Plan.
- Some residents question whether this represents a renewed effort to advance the Event Center and boutique hotel concept through Town-issued bonds. Is it a second bite at the apple?

Questions Residents Are Asking

- Were residents ever contacted about the Town potentially taking on this level of debt?
- Do residents support a Town-owned Event Center?
- After the Biddle Farm development, do residents trust the current Town administration to budget, oversee, and manage a project of this size and financial scope?

Community Discussion Continues

- Residents across Farragut continue to evaluate how these decisions may shape the Town’s long-term planning, financial commitments, and development priorities. While candidate Povlin says no property tax, her support of the Event Center and boutique hotel concerns residents.

I am voting for and support Alex Cain for Farragut Mayor and Greg Wiberley for South Ward Alderman. Our town desperately needs new management on the Board of Mayor and Aldermen. These strong candidates are that needed new management.

In the last ten years on the Board of Mayor and Aldermen, we have seen a steady decline in responsibility and representation to the people. Town leaders have ignored the goals and ideals that guided Farragut's founding, and their actions have directly caused a dramatic increase in housing density and traffic in our community. Officials changed lot sizes from 20,000 square feet to almost 10,000 square feet, and they forced 781 four-story apartments onto residents. The founders set the apartment limit at two stories.

If we look at the National Community Survey of 2025, we see the people of Farragut love the place they live in but give only fair to poor grades for the operation of the Board of Mayor and Aldermen and the Farragut Planning Commission. Observations from a retiring communications manager

By the time you read this, I'll have retired from the Town of Farragut after 9.5 years of service as the communications manager/PR and marketing coordinator. When I was first hired, I was part of the Parks & Recreation Department and primarily wrote media releases about events and programs. Oh, how times have changed!

Working for the Town of Farragut has been rewarding in many ways, but I most appreciate the opportunity to work with Town staff, who are devoted to making Farragut better every day. Here are some of the experiences I've enjoyed the most:

Working at Town events: I was hired by Parks & Rec director Sue Stuhl, and it was one of her policies that new staff work every event during their first year. That's a lot of events. My favorites are Freaky Friday Fright Nite (candy and costumes are always fun) and the Shamrock Ball. When you make kids happy, it's contagious.

Opening new Town ameni-

ties: Ribbon cuttings are fantastic because they're the public announcement of the end of a project — usually a very long project. The most memorable grand opening was that of the Farragut Community Center on Jan. 16, 2020, the 40th anniversary of the incorporation of Farragut. The Town's partnership with Knox County to purchase the former Faith Lutheran Church has provided a space for thousands of events and classes since then, both at the community center and the West Knox County Senior Center. This amazing local government partnership was recognized last year by the Tennessee Municipal League.

Another memorable ribbon cutting event was the opening of the Campbell Station Inn in January. This historic property was purchased in 2013, so the renovation and repurposing of the inn was a long time coming. It was worth the wait! The grand opening of Phase 3 of McFee Park in 2022 also stands out. The addition of the Great Lawn, tennis and bas-

ketball courts and the Great Lawn Pavilion made McFee Park a true destination.

Interacting with and informing the community: I'm not going to say that interacting with the community is always positive. As it turns out, it's much easier to criticize than it is to compliment local government. (To learn more, watch Citizen's Forum during a Board of Mayor and Aldermen meeting at townoffarragut.org/agendas or check out the Town's Facebook account.) But when the community steps up to ask sincere questions or offer constructive comments, good stuff happens. There are several ways to do this:

- Schedule a meeting with a staff member or visit the reception desk at Farragut Town Hall. If you have questions or comments about development within Farragut, a road project, our parks and greenways or any other topic that staff can address, they're happy to chat. Calling 865-966-7057 also works.
- Attend a public input session. The Community De-



velopment Department will soon ask for feedback as they update the Town's Comprehensive Land Use Plan, and a few weeks later, the Parks & Rec Department will ask for input on amenities for the new park property on McFee Road. These are both important opportunities to share your thoughts and learn more about how local government works.

- Reach out to individual board members. Their email addresses are available at

townoffarragut.org/board. Farragut is an amazing community, and those who are fortunate enough to live here should appreciate the things that make it unique: a volunteer government, a friendly and accessible staff, attractive public buildings, beautiful parks and greenways and a multitude of events and programs for all ages — all without an additional property tax. Former gas stations, retail centers, and underused corridors are now home to thriving restaurants, shops, medical offices, banks, and service businesses. Major reinvestment occurred throughout Biddle Farms, Dixie Lee, Parkside, Farragut Town Center, and the Outlet area, bringing strong occupancy and renewed economic activity.

Safer Roads & Smarter Infrastructure

Significant roadway and traffic improvements were completed or advanced across Farragut, including Campbell Station Road, Concord Road, Kingston Pike, Watt Road, Union Road, Virtue Road, Peterson Road, and North Boyd Station Road. Projects included new turn lanes, roundabouts, sidewalks, bike lanes, crosswalks, lighting, guardrails, and traffic-calming measures. A modernized traffic signal system improved traffic flow, pedestrian safety, and ADA accessibility town-wide.

Revitalizing Farragut's Commercial Core

Under my leadership team, dozens of long-vacant, outdated, or blighted properties were demolished, rebuilt, or repurposed. Former gas stations, retail centers, and underused corridors are now home to thriving restaurants, shops, ADA accessibility town-wide.

Major upgrades were delivered at McFee Park, Mayor Bob Leonard Park, Anchor Park, and neighborhood pocket parks. Town Hall renovations were completed, public plazas and streetscapes enhanced, additional park land acquired, and long-range planning advanced for transportation, stormwater, and corridor improvements—positioning Farragut for continued success.

Admirals lax standouts earn All-State honors

This past season, both Farragut lacrosse programs saw a fair share of success.

The boys lacrosse program won its second-straight region title and advanced to the state semifinals for the second consecutive year.

On the girls side, the Lady Ads fell to Cookeville in heart-breaking fashion to end the season.

Both programs received All-State nods, as several players were recognized for their efforts.

Admirals senior captain Brock Lockhart earned his second consecutive All-State award from the Tennessee Boys Lacrosse Association, totaling 121 goals and 190 points in his career to become the all-time points leader in FHS history.

He also exemplified the kind of leadership that can leave an indelible mark on a program.

“He was what every coach wants and needs as a leader,” said head coach Ben Sachs of Lockhart. “It didn’t matter who you were. He lifted you up on and off the field, sharing any knowledge he could with anybody. A prime example of what it means to be a captain. He had a selflessness and dedication, making sure guys were in the right spot, at practice,

talking to them to build them up.

“He is really someone I wish every team could experience because it changes the whole dynamic of the group with the way he brought leadership to our team. I truly feel privileged to have spent the last two years with him. His numbers speak for his talent, but the leadership was a whole different ballgame.”

Finn Sachs also received his second consecutive All-State award. He averaged 3.8 goals and 1.7 assists per game this season with a .514 shot percentage and he sits 15 points away from Lockhart’s point record at the end of his sophomore campaign.

“His junior year is going to be big for him,” head coach Ben Sachs said. “I really see him continuing to grow as a player and a leader. He has a skill set that allows him to dictate what he wants to do on and off the field.

“He’ll almost be the face of Farragut lacrosse because of the hard work he’s put in, and there is no limit to what he can do — it’s all up to how much work he wants to put in. He’s going to be someone that younger players will look up to.”

Moses Burnette earned his first All-State nod this year, totaling a team-high 31 take-aways on the season.

“One of the biggest things was this was his third year playing lacrosse,” Sachs said of Burnette. “He really dedicated himself to becoming a great player and learning the sport as quickly as he could. He became a student of the game and was so effective cutting off passes, finding gaps and moved the ball to the offensive side so we could score.”

Nick Toth brought a similar impact, netting 27 takeaways for the Admirals while making things tough for opposing offenses.

“He really forced turnovers this year, getting about two a game,” Sachs said. “And most offensive players, when matched up with him, would immediately pass it away. Players didn’t really want to go one-on-one with him, and he forced guys to rethink their approach. He was a tone-setter for us, making a slide or body check to someone like, ‘If you’re going to try and shoot, you’re going to have to go through me.’”

Luke Duenckel also earned an All-State nod, racking up 74 grounds balls this year.

“I expect Luke to continue his effort,” Sachs said. “One of the greatest things about him is that he is the example of effort over talent. He won ground balls, ate shots and gave 110 percent. If every player put that effort into their lives, they

the CEO of the Women’s Basketball Hall of Fame.

next level in pitching or hitting and reminded me to keep making adjustments.”

Little did Johnston know how that advice would pay off down the road.

In the meantime, he threw up to 94 mph on the mound and batted .368 with 13 home runs his senior season.

The plate presence drew the eye of then-Texas A&M head coach Jim Schlossnagle, and Johnston headed for College Station, intent on proving his worth.

A new chapter

Johnston started three times on mound as a freshman while the Aggies made a College World Series run before losing against Tennessee.

Schlossnagle departed for Texas soon thereafter, though, and Johnston headed to the Cape Cod League to prepare for a new start with the Auburn Tigers.

Only then he started 0-for-17 at the plate — enduring what Johnston called “the worst slump of my life.”

“At that point, I was trying to figure out my swing and approach,” he added. “But I also kind of realized I wouldn’t be able to do that in the SEC or at the highest level.”

The thought remained in Johnston’s mind as he moved on to the Appalachian League, where a .320 batting average paved the way for a strong start at Auburn.

But a rolled ankle kept him from pushing for an outfield spot later that year as a hitter.

So he made an adjustment and decided to focus solely on pitching going into his draft year as a junior.

“I made an executive decision for my future, and I spent so much time praying about it, not knowing what the right answer was,” Johnston added. “Maybe I could have hit .350 this year and been a first-rounder, but I wanted to put myself in the best position. Auburn supported me

the whole way and gave me all the resources I needed to succeed.”

A fresh approach

Because of his freshness to pitching full-time, Johnston had not done any of the pitcher-specific workouts since he was always working on other things, too.

So he locked in on the refined exercises, appreciating the difference he felt each day. “Eliminating the hitting made my body feel better,” he said “and cleared my mind and helped me get better.”

It paid off in draft stock, too, as Detroit took Johnston with the intent of molding him into a starter.

“And I’ve never had that,” he said. “I didn’t have time to be anything but a reliever at Auburn, so I guess Detroit really saw something.”

“They’ve seen so many arms with so many pitches and know what works, so I’m trusting that they’ll take care of whatever needs to get done and I’ll have to do a lot myself to get better, too.”

Now, as Johnston departs Farragut for pro baseball later this month, he will have plenty more learning to do.

But he will take the lessons he learned on the field where he trained just a day after watching his draft dream come true.

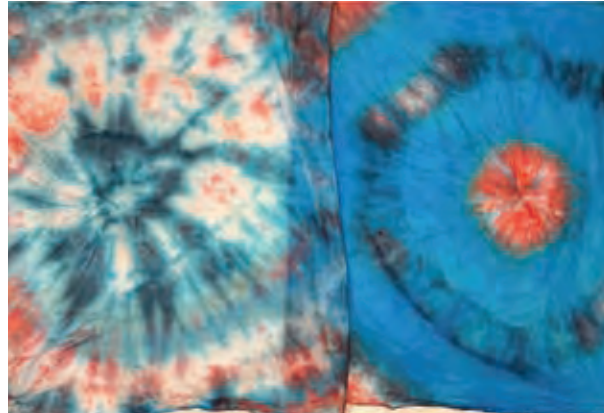

Reveiz chronicles 'adventure of a lifetime'

After nearly a year of planning, my wife, Nancy, and I were finally on our way to begin the adventure of a lifetime — the Camino de Santiago.

Our journey began with an overnight flight from Boston to Paris. Since our overnight train to southern France didn't leave until 10 p.m., we had nine hours to explore Paris. The hop-on, hop-off bus tour was the perfect way to experience many of the city's iconic sights before boarding what turned out to be an incredible sleeper train to Bayonne. The next morning, after a short train ride, we arrived in Saint-Jean-Pied-de-Port, France — the traditional starting point for thousands of Camino pilgrims each year.

After watching countless videos and reading everything we could about this charming French village, it was surreal

to finally stand at the beginning of our 580-plus-mile pilgrimage to Santiago de Compostela, with plans to continue to the Atlantic coast at Finis-terre.

4,500 feet of elevation gain to Roncesvalles, Spain. Mountain weather is famously unpredictable, but we were fortunate. The climb was challenging, yet every step rewarded us with breathtaking views that made the effort worthwhile.

About 10 minutes into our first day, we met Bob from San Diego. Before long, it felt like we had known him for years. Later that same day, we met Ilona from the Netherlands, and just like that, our Camino family began to take shape. On the third day, Melissa from Chicago joined our little group, and from then on the five of us shared countless miles, conversations, laughs and unforgettable memories. Some fellow pilgrims even nicknamed us "The Brady Bunch."

Experienced pilgrims often describe the Camino as a journey in three stages: physical,

mental and spiritual. During the first few weeks, your body is simply trying to adjust to the daily miles, sore muscles and aching feet. Eventually, the challenge becomes mental as you learn to embrace the daily routine, adapt to changing conditions and keep moving forward one step at a time. The final stage is often described as spiritual — a time when gratitude replaces discomfort, and you realize how little you truly need to be happy.

Our daily routine quickly became second nature. We woke before dawn, carefully taped any hot spots on our feet to prevent blisters, applied plenty of Vaseline, packed our backpacks and started walking. A heat wave had settled over much of Europe, so most mornings we were on the trail by 4 a.m. to avoid the afternoon temperatures.

Each afternoon followed a familiar pattern: find our albergue (pilgrim lodging), check in, enjoy a well-earned

In a separate interview, Walker said he is anxious to be president.

“It’s a lot of pressure because there are so many past presidents still participating in the club, and I have a lot to live up to,” he said. However, he added, “It’s a good thing and so many have offered to help in whatever form they can.”

as part of a Sharing the Spirit of America program, which took place in Farragut Town Hall Wednesday, July 8.

The event also was an opportunity to celebrate the life of Admiral David Glasgow Farragut, who was born July 5, 1801, in Stony Point, later called Lowe's Ferry.

"On July 4, 1776, the Second Continental Congress approved the Declaration of Independence in Philadelphia," Farragut Mayor Ron Williams said. "This important document was written to formally announce and justify the 13 American colonies' separation from Great Britain.

"Four days later, on July 8, the Declaration of Independence was read aloud in public for the first time by Col. John Nixon," Williams said. "Because colonists could not witness the Continental Congress in real time, public readings were how ordinary citizens learned they were a new nation.

"Today, people across all 50 states and 16 U.S. territories will read the Declaration of Independence to commemorate its first public reading," he said. "I am proud to be part of Farragut's participation in the national America 250 event.

"Thank you to everyone who is celebrating with us."

Following the posting of colors and Pledge of Allegiance from Farragut High School Reserve Officer Training Corps, Virtue Church Pastor Bill Lyle recited President and

Gen. George Washington's prayer.

However, first he referred to the First Continental Congress on Sept. 7, 1774, saying, "after the men gathered together to write this document ... they realized they had to have the blessing of God. So, they called the Rev. Jacob Bouchard to come and open with prayer. He read Psalm 35."

Then, "they had two hours of spontaneous prayer that were going on," Lyle said. "This country was founded as a Christian country. That was ratified in 1882 by the Supreme Court case, The Church of Holy Trinity vs. The U.S."

Then, he recited Washington's prayer of 1783, "as he was residing as the commander-in-chief of the Continental Army," Lyle said. "This prayer is read at Mount Vernon often."

The prayer begins, "Now, I make it my earnest prayer that God would have these United States in his holy protection."

FHS's chorus members, Abby Lu Eckles and Rafika Amlani, singing of the national anthem, Star Spangled Banner, followed the prayer.

Then the reading of the Declaration of Independence began with Knox County director of Veterans Affairs Buzz Buswell, followed by Andrew Bogle Chapter of the DAR representative Judy Wilson, Museum Committee member Sue-Ann Hansler and retired U.S. Navy Chief Todd Johnson, taking turns reading the Declaration of Independence.

"We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are

created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among those are the pursuit of Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness" ... are the familiar words school children still learn.

In hearing the words, the Declaration justifies the separation, relating the injustices evoked against the colonists by Britain, "a design to reduce them under absolute Despo-

tism" when it "burned our towns and destroyed the lives of our people."

Following the reading, local historian Frank Galbraith related the life of Admiral Farragut.

Originally, David Glasgow Farragut was named James Glasgow Farragut, but after his mother died, Galbraith related how Commander David Porter with the U.S. Navy took in the boy, who was encour-

aged to join the Navy when he was still a child. Farragut would later change his name from James to David to honor his foster father.

"At the age of 9 and a half, [Porter] got [Farragut] in the Navy," Galbraith said. He related Farragut's service at the time of the Battle of Mobile Bay during the Civil War and how Farragut would be the first full admiral in the Navy.

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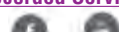
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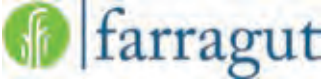
